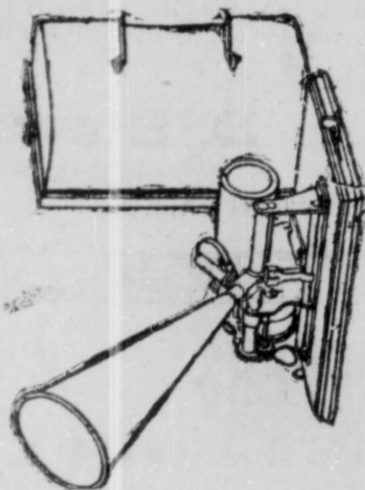

**FRUITS OF DECEPTION.**

The Winnipeg Tribune (clean Liberal) declares that the landslide which overtook Mr. Greenway was as much a punishment to him for his association with the Dominion Government as a reversal for himself. "At a Dominion election," it says, the expression of popular feeling would be much more decided, for large numbers of electors whose attachment to the Local Government kept them from voting against it would unhesitatingly declare against the present policy of the Dominion Government as it affects the West. Indeed, with the exception of those who have something to hope or fear from the holders of office, few men are to be found who do not express dissatisfaction with that policy."

The Tribune shows that the Ministers of today promised in the West great changes in respect of railways and the tariff, but promptly repudiated their promises when they took office. On the railway question they have done nothing beyond establishing new corporations and giving vast subsidies in money or in land. "The policy followed is not Liberal and progressive, but a sort of shoddy Conservatism of a bad type." As to the tariff, the Government, after its strong declarations that it would introduce free trade, has trifled with the question. "From one quarter we are told that ten years' tariff stability is wanted, from another that the tariff is out of politics, from another that Ministers are still free traders in principle, and that if we only trust to them and say nothing, everything will be all right." At the same time the Ministers are pretending to be protectionists, and, the Tribune says, "we ask ourselves, who is being duped—the Manitoba farmer or the Red ParLOUR?" The Western Liberals, it is added, are not unreasonable. "But we do not want to be humbugged by vague professions, or to be told that the present tariff is not protective. We want to know where the Government really stands. We ask for frankness, candour and straightforward dealing." "As the Mail and Empire remarks, 'everybody has been deceived.'"

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

The Toronto Globe remarks that "so far as Canada is concerned, each reverse but adds to the satisfaction that is felt that a thousand of our sons are in South Africa, standing shoulder to shoulder in what has indubitably become the cause of the empire."

In the course of an article on the result of the elections in Belfast and Murray Harbour The Telegram of Winnipeg says truly that, "These two constituencies of Prince Edward Island have not only condemned the Farquharson Government for its extravagance and neglect of the public interest; they have also entered a protest against the course of the Liberal government at Ottawa. Sir Louis Davies bears the same relationship to the Provincial Liberal Government in Prince Edward Island, as Mr. Sifton has borne to the Provincial Liberal Government in Manitoba. The defeat of the Government candidates in Prince Edward Island is almost as severe a blow to Sir Louis Davies' prestige, as was the damage Mr. Sifton's reputation sustained by the verdict of the people of Manitoba at the provincial elections yesterday week. Sir Louis Davies is one of the prominent apostles of the new Liberalism. He enjoys the unenviable distinction of being the principal associate of Messrs. Tarte, Sifton and Blair in forcing upon the Liberal party the cynically perfidious policy pursued by the Laurier Government, in defiance of the traditions of the true Liberalism and in opposition to the protests of all honest Liberals. It is a great encouragement to Conservatives in the West, as indeed it must be to Conservatives in all Canada, to know that the far East is at one with the West in rising in revolt against the evil rule which is being forced upon the country by the Laurier Government. It betokens that, at the next Federal elections, the Laurier Government will be swept out of existence by an indignant people, and once more the destinies of Canada will be confided to the safe guidance of a Conservative administration."
