Morell Seaman With Weather Station In Arctic

Able Seaman Joseph K. MacDonald, Morell, is a member of a communications staff of nine which will man radio equipment and make meteorological observations at the Arctic radio station on Padlong Island.

The island lies off the east coast of Baffin Island, across Davis Strait from Greenland. The Defence Department recently announced that the operation of the station was taken over by the Canadian Navy from the United States Air Force.

For nearly eight months of the year Padlong is completely isolated and supplies and mail are parachuted to it. Bulk of the supplies are delivered by boat during the summer.

P.O. William K. Carson of Toronto, a communications expert, is in command of the station, which has a complement of 23. There are 18 sailors and five Eskimos.

The communications staff which will man radio equipment and make meteorological observations was specially trained at H. M. C. S. Shearwater, Dartmouth, N. S.
