Will Carry Out Naval Inspection

Rear Admiral Kenneth F. Adams, C.D., R.C.N., Naval Division Flag Officer, whose headquarters is at Hamilton, Ontario, will carry out the annual inspection of the local Reserve Division on Tuesday, February 11. He will be accompanied here by His Flag Lieutenant, Comba, C.D., R.C.N. This will be the Admiral's final visit as inspecting officer as he is scheduled to retire from active duty April 2nd, after completing more than 33 years services with the Royal Canadian Navy. His successor will be Commodore Edward W. Finch-Noyes, C.D., R.C.N., who is in the 32nd year of service.

In April, 1953, the Rear Admiral was responsible for the establishing of the headquarters for the Naval Reserve of Canada, at Hamilton.

The inspecting officer is due to arrive in the City by service aircraft at about eleven a. m. Tuesday, and will be met at the airport by Commander J. N. Kenny, C. D., R. C. N. (R), Commanding Officer of H. M. C. S. Queen Charlotte, and Lt. James Clapton R. C. N. Staff Officer.

At two p.m., he will commence making his official calls upon Mayor J. D. Stewart, Premier A. W. Matheson and His Honour,

Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse. Following the inspection the Commanding Officer and officers will hold a reception for the Rear Admiral in the Wardroom. Invited to attend are the members of the Naval Officers Association, Charlottetown Branch and officers of the three Sea Cadet corps in P. E. I.

Rear Admiral Adams' will end early Wednesday morning when he will take off to visit other Naval Divisions in the Maritimes.

Strike Menace To Province

Should there be a general strike of Canadian railroad workers called this winter this Province would be extremely hard hit in the opening of Mr. R. Earle Taylor, chairman of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

"A strike at this time would deal the Province one of the most crippling blows it has ever suffered," he stated.

He was commenting on the warning issued by W.E. Gamble of Montreal, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers that Canada faces a nationwide general rail strike if the railways act on the Kellogg report findings published on Tuesday.

Mr. Taylor noted that while other areas of Canada can depend to a great extent on truck transportation, even if a strike hits the railways this is not so on the Island which is wholly dependent upon the connecting link which the CNR provides at Borden.

talks would re-open shortly on the issues which produced the strike threat.

Lt. Col. Frank Storey, who acted as controller of traffic during the 1950 railway strike said a strike at this time of year would be even more serious than that which took place eight years ago.

In that earlier strike the economy of the Island suffered seriously, shortages of many kinds developed and travellers were inconvenienced seriously.

Col. Storey said the committee he headed succeeded in getting the then Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent to have the Borden ferry put back on the run one day before the strike ended.

Will Show Canine Rocket Travellers At World Fair

 MOSCOW (AP)—The Russians will show their canine rocket travellers at the Brussels world fair opening April 17, the official in charge of the Soviet exhibits announced Wednesday.

Dmitri A. Ryzhkov said dogs chosen will be kennel mates of Laika, whose body is circling the earth in the second Soviet satellite. All are veterans of successful trips into the stratosphere, he added.

The Russians will display models of their two Sputniks and the instruments and equipment used to track their courses. But the Soviet official added there will be no models of the rocket carriers or the launching apparatus.

One of the main features of the Soviet exhibit will be a demonstration of how nuclear energy may be used for peaceful purposes. Ryzhkov said mockups will be used because conditions at the fair will not be suitable for actual demonstrations.

The exhibit director said the

Soviet government is negotiating with Belgium to establish twin-jet TU-104 airline connections between Moscow and Brussels.

MAY CONTINUE SERVICE

If the flights begin in time for the fair they may continue permanently, Ryzhkov added.

Two Soviet ships will shuttle tourists from Leningrad and large numbers of Soviet citizens already have applied for permission to attend, Ryzhkov said.

Three ships are en route with 2,500 exhibits which weigh 2,000 tons.

The exhibits will be housed in a glittering pavilion of steel, aluminum and glass at the centre of which will stand a giant statue of Lenin.

A Russian restaurant staffed by 10 Soviet chefs will dispense Russian delicacies. Visitors also will receive a regular news sheet called "Sputnik."

Ryzhkov said the pavilion itself will cost 200,000,000 Belgian francs (about \$4,000,000) and the cost of the exhibits will be absorbed by the enterprises contributing them.
