A HEAVY DEFICIT

In the Province of Quebec

Will They Economise or Look to Canada
to Help Them out?

QUEBEC, Dec. 3.—The public accounts
were laid before the House of Assembly
yesterday. On their face they show
ordinary receipts of \$3,874,803 during the
year ending June 30, 1897, and ordinary
expenditures of \$4,853,927. The total
receipts exclusive of loans amounted to
\$3,923,238 and the total disbursements to
\$6,634,944.

HEAVY FIGHTING.

Losses on Part of the British.

SIMLA, Dec. 3.—Despatches from the
front say that the Curran column of the
British Punitive force has met with a fierce
resistance of its march into the Chain-
kanni country. The fighting has been
very heavy. Lieut. Battye was killed,
Lieut. Villers Stewart severely wounded,
and Lieut. Pennington slightly wounded.
Two Sepoys were killed and fourteen
wounded.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—The Department of
Militia is preparing a new edition of the
rules and regulations governing the militia
force.

broken his leg.

Fire in Halifax.

HALIFAX, Dec. 3.—A fire at the works
of the Heat & Light Company last night
badly damaged one of their buildings.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

BERLIN, Dec. 1.—All sorts of wild
rumors are current here and at Kiel, prob-
ably based in the main upon the speech of
Emperor William at the opening of the
reichstag, as to the relations between
Germany and China. But most of these
are discredited. The National Zeitung has
confirmed the statement of the Emperor that
Germany's only object in the occupation of
Kiao Chau is to protect German mis-
sionaries in China, and the alarmist rumor
is now taken with a liberal allowance of
salt. A sensation was caused today by a
report that the Chinese had massacred
two hundred German sailors belonging to
the German cruiser Division in Kiao Chau

Bay, but there has been no confirmation of
this; while the latest despatches received
from Admiral Von Diederich, commander
of the Division, which were dated the
afternoon of Nov. 28, make no reference
to fighting at Kiao Chau.
The Berlin Tageblatt is responsible for
the statement that two additional cruisers
are going to Kiao Chau, bringing the force
there up to ten ships with 4,000 men and
140 guns. The same journal says also
that a force of marines, including the crew
of the Imperial yacht Hohenzollern, is going
to Kiao Chau, but there is no official
confirmation of these assertions, although
they are held to indicate that a perma-
nent occupation is intended, especially as
it is understood that China does not insist
upon evacuation.

ROME, Dec. 1.—The minister of finance
Signor Luzzati, made his financial state-
ment in the chamber of deputies to-day.
It showed a surplus of 34,000,000 lire for
the financial year of 1896-97.

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—Carpenter & Son,
fruit exporters, Winona, have sent a con-
signment of Canadian apples and pears to
the West Indies, via Halifax. The ship-
ment consists of two hundred boxes, and
the fruit is neatly packed, something in
the same style as California fruit comes to
Canadian market.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—A despatch to the
Times from Montevideo says that an at-
tempt was made there yesterday to stab
Senor Jose Cuestas, president ad interim
of Uruguay. It was unsuccessful, the by-
standers warding off the would-be assas-
sin. The man was formerly a member of
the Montevideo police force. The news
of the outrage spread rapidly and caused
great excitement, but the city is under
martial law and there has been no out-
break.

CAIRO, Dec. 1.—It is rumored here that
the Anglo-Egyptian forces have occupied
Metemeh, on the Nile the main Dervish
position between Berber, the headquarters,
of the expeditionary force, and Omdurman
near Khartoum, the stronghold of the
Dervishes. The latter are said to have
evacuated Metemeh previous to its
occupation by the Anglo-Egyptian forces.
Metemeh is less than 150 miles, as the
crow flies, from Omdurman.

KAISERSLAUTERN, Rhenish, Bavaria, Dec.
1.—A fire damp explosion has taken place
in the Frankenhof coal mine near Ham-
burg. Ten men are known to have been
killed and 45 injured. Others are still
missing.

QUEBEC, Dec. 1.—A deputation of Mon-
treal grocers are here asking that the
pharmacy act be changed so as to permit
the sale of patent medicines by grocers,
and also certain other articles of common
use now classified as drugs, such as linseed,
epsom salts, etc.

It is generally expected that the Dom-
inion Parliament will be called together
for Thursday, January 20th.
