MONA HORSES SHIPPED.—On Saturday morning last, says the Summerside Agriculturalist, Mr. Hart shipped by the Northumberland, for the American markets, four horses, valued at \$925. Capt. Barnard shipped one, valued at \$225, by the same boat, to a purchaser at St. Stephen, N. B., and another party shipped one, valued at \$100.

PLANTING OYSTERS.—The Minister of Marine and Fisheries purpose planting Shadecol harbor, as well as Summerside harbor, with oysters, with a view of restoring the fisheries in these localities to their former productive state. Mr. Richard Hunt, who has had considerable experience in oyster culture, was in Summerside a few days ago, at the request of the Fisheries department, to inspect the old beds and report upon their condition for receiving oysters for breeding purposes. He informs us that the beds are in prime condition and that excellent results may be expected from the venture. We hope to see the work proceeded with at once.—Agriculturist.

AFTER JOHN L.—The Chinese are rapidly becoming civilized. Lee Bin Nam, a noted Chinese pugilist, was in Baltimore a few days ago on his way to New York from San Francisco. A reporter who interviewed Lee Bin Nam, says the Celestial will in all probability challenge John L. Sullivan to fight. Wong Chin Foo asserts that Lee's reputation as a fighter throughout the Chinese Kingdom is about on a par with that of the "Boston Boy" in America. The celebrated eyed fighter is 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighs about 200 pounds and is finely built. His "pig tail" reaches to the ground.

TARTE-McGREGGEEY CASE.

An Important Witness

Captain Larkins on the Stand.

Exonerates Sir Hector and the McGreevy's From Murphy's Charges.

OTTAWA, Aug. 3. In the Tarte-McGreevy inquest on Saturday Captain Larkins, of the firm of Larkins, Connolly and Co. was again examined. He said that Murphy was first engaged as a foreman over boys and men engaged in breaking stone. Then Murphy bought Nehan's interest in the firm. This trouble with Murphy began in 1885 when his explanations for large payments were unsatisfactory. But Murphy never then suggested that the money was paid to Thomas McGreevy. Murphy's evidence that Thomas McGreevy had given instructions how to obtain the contract for the graving dock at Esquimaux was untrue. Larkins gave other very important testimony, thoroughly exonerating Sir Hector Langevin, Thomas McGreevy and Engineer Perley from the charge which Murphy had tried to fasten on them. Larkins testified that he was a Grit in politics, and chairman of the Grit Association of Lincoln County, Ontario. He was in the habit of liberally subscribing to his party's funds. He said that the Globe had once contained an article forcibly denouncing the proposed change in the Esquimaux dock, as being solely in the interest of contractors. He immediately wrote to J. D. Edgar, M. P., one of the Globe directors, remonstrating, and then the Globe turned round and supported the changes. He was ordered to procure the letter.

Sir John Thompson reversed the mode of conducting investigation pursued by the grits, and told them that hereafter it would be conducted differently. Some of the Conservative members have started to carry the war into Africa, and the grits are bitterly protesting. The weather here is delightfully cool and pleasant.

PARNELL AGAIN.

Popular At Thurles.

DUBLIN, Aug. 3. Mr. Parnell received a magnificent reception yesterday at Thurles. The populace detached the horses from the carriage and drew it themselves to Market Place. Parnell re-affirmed his distrust of the Liberals and said that his policy would not change. He warned Messrs. Dillon and O'Brien that they were pursuing a dangerous course in following Mr. Gladstone. William O'Brien reproaches Lord Salisbury for taking advantage of a legal technicality in procuring his adjudication as bankrupt.

The Drouth in Texas.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3. The terrible drouth prevailing in southwest Texas was broken Saturday night by a violent rain storm. Only two showers had fallen in nine weeks. The cotton and corn crops are ruined and cattle are dying.

LONDON, Aug. 3. Mr. Spurgeon's condition is tranquil; but he does not improve.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Aug. 3.—Anticosti—Good fishing off Head Point, but no fishing of any kind elsewhere on the coast. Quebec.—Cod good at Long Point and Magpie, and fair at Thunder River, Perce, Newport Point and Paspébiac. Lunce good at Thunder River, Moisi and Long Point. A few herring were caught at Perce and Paspébiac. New Brunswick.—No inshore fishing at Caraquette during the past week, and bankers had only very poor fares of cod. There were few fish of any kind taken on the coast of P. E. Island or Cape Breton, the weather being still unfavorable. Nova Scotia.—Good prospects of herring in the nets at Whitehead, but no signs of any other fish. A few cod and haddock were taken at Spry Bay, a good haul of cod-fish at Lunenburg, and an excellent catch of hake and haddock at Digby. Squid are reported very plentiful at Crow Harbor.

The annual picnic of St. James' Sabbath School is being held at Shaw's wharf, West River, to-day. The weather is delightful, and the attendance large. The Southport made two trips to West River, one at 9 this morning, and the other at two this afternoon.
