P.E.I. Fish And Game Ass'n Presents Lengthy Reports

A lengthy session including reports from various wildlife branches, and discussions over a wide range of subjects pertinent to hunting, fishing and conservation practices were heard Tuesday night at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association held at the YMCA.

President Nelson Hurry of Charlottetown was re-elected unanimously for another term at the head of the Provincial body. Jack McAndrew of Charlottetown was also introduced to the representatives as the permanent executive secretary-treasurer.

A report was given to the representatives by Mr. McAndrew and Mr. Hurry on discussions held with the Provincial Cabinet and the Progressive Conservative caucus over proposed amendments to the existing Fish and Game Protection Act.

The Fish and Game Association recently presented a brief to these bodies in support of the re-vamping.

WELL RECEIVED

Mr. McAndrew said their delegation had been received most cordially by both groups and a fair hearing. A number of ques-

tions had been asked regarding several potentially controversial features of the new amendments, but it was felt by the delegation that satisfactory answers had been given.

It was also reported that the Leader of the Opposition had also been contacted within the past week requesting an appearance before the Liberal caucus, but that no answer had been received as yet.

It was decided by the representatives that each branch would visit legislative members in its own districts and discuss the provisions of the new act and its desirability to the province as a whole.

President Hurry expressed the opinion that the amendments stood an excellent chance of being passed into legislation this session of the house provided the membership of the Fish and Game Association worked in support of the proposed legislation.

A resolution introduced by Lowell Huestis, president of the East Prince Branch, regarding the banning of twenty-two calibre rifles as a hunting weapon, was adopted after thorough discussion.

The executive was directed to pass on to the Minister of Fisheries, Mr. Rossiter, a resolution which calls for the banning of the twenty-two calibre as a hunting weapon, and provides for its use only as a target rifle on a property constituted range or for predator control under special permit.

PLAN CONTEST

In another highlight of the meeting it was decided to hold an essay and poster contest in Island schools as a feature of Wildlife Week which this year will be held April 19 to 26.

Prizes will be given by each branch in district competition and a grand provincial prize of \$25 will be awarded by the Provincial Executive for the top entrant in each category.

The contest will be held with the co-operation of the Department of Education.

Then East Prince Association went on record as favoring a limited open season on Hungarian Partridge in that country during the next fall season, and it was decided that each branch conduct discussions in their own districts and consider the matter of an open season at a future meeting.

President Hurry reported to the meeting that several members had undertaken the pla-

ing of nesting boxes for wood ducks in National Park and other protected ponds. Forty wood ducks will be imported into the province by the wildlife Service and experimental attempts made to restock the beautiful little number of the duck family.

R.E. Jenkins reported that a number of ducks has been reported in danger of starvation in the Vernon River District as a result of the recent cold spell, and asked for action on the matter.

It was decided that feed would be purchased and set out for the birds to tide them over the period of closed water.

Mr. Jenkins asked that additional reports of ducks in danger of starvation be passed on to him or President Hurry so that action could be taken. He suggested that an appeal be made to the public so that this valuable species be given what aid was possible to prevent further depletion of breeding stock.

Georgetown Town Council Reviews Plans, Estimates

GEORGETOWN - The town council resumed a meeting here Monday night which had been adjourned from their regular monthly meeting on February 14th. The meeting was presided over by Mayor Howard S. MacLean and Councillors Currie, MacLean, Johnson and Lavers were in attendance.

The Council studied plans and estimates of costs for the setting up of a trailer court on the east side of town, lying between the Burnt Point Road extensions of Richmond and Grafton Streets. The area was designated as a suitable site for a trailer court by Walter Desliva in his report on Georgetown.

Two plans were studied and the costs relating to the installing of water, sewage, electricity and street facilities as they pertained to each of the plans.

The Council favours the plan that sets off an area the size of the existing town blocks. It is divided into standard size town lots but, for the purpose of the trailer court, each lot is divided, allowing the placing of thirty two trailers in the area.

For the present it was decided that, if the project is proceeded with, provisions and facilities would be developed for sixteen trailer parking spaces with

Speech May Give Election Indication

An exciting session is predicted for this afternoon's opening of the provincial legislature and there is a feeling that the Speech from the Throne to be read by Lieut. Gov. W. J. MacDonald may be an indication of whether or not there will be a spring election this year.

The speech this year is expected to be of usual length as compared to those of the past few years. One report indicates that it will run between 35 and 40 paragraphs in length.

Contents of the speech have been kept under wraps but several cabinet ministers have already said "there will be plenty in it for our departments."

Observers say that if the speech forecasts heavy spending by such departments as welfare and health, an early election is indicated. Already the government has pledged increased spending on civil servants' and teachers' salaries.

Some wrangling is expected to develop over the election act, passed at the 1963 session, but proclaimed last week. The legislation dissolves two seats in the Georgetown area, now held by Liberals, and gives two more seats to Charlottetown.

Legislation affecting municipalities may be introduced at the forthcoming session. Former Municipal Affairs Minister J. David Stewart was in the process of directing the formation
