Georgetown Youth Succumbs To Injuries

"The death occurred at the King's County Hospital, Montague, early yesterday morning of Vincent Prosper, Georgetown, in his 20th year, following an accident which occurred at New Perth on Monday morning. The young man was engaged with Mr. Alan Muir, also of Georgetown, sawing lumber, when the fly-wheel burst sending fragments in every direction. Mr. Prosper was struck on the left arm, severing it, and another piece struck him on the right leg shattering his thigh and thigh bone. He was taken immediately to the King's County Hospital, but lost considerable blood en route. He received blood transfusions but succumbed yesterday morning.

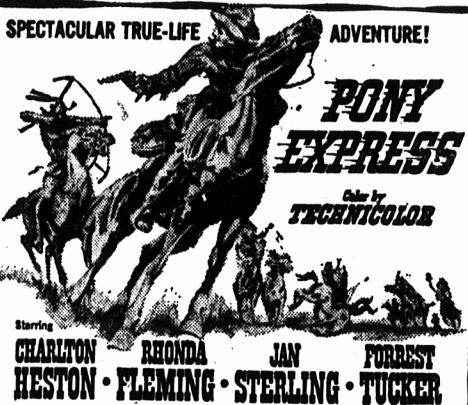
