Misouche Firemen Open Drive For Family

SUMMERSIDE — A campaign to obtain clothing and furniture for a Misouche family of five who lost everything but the frame of their home in an early morning fire Thursday, has been started by the Misouche Firemen's Club.

In critical condition in Prince George's hospital are Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Thibodeau who sustained second and third degree burns in the blaze that gutted their 24 by 24 ft. home. The at-

tending physician yesterday said there had been no change in their condition and that they could "remain critical for days". In satisfactory condition, their son John, 24, is receiving treatment and will probably remain in hospital for at least another day or two. He sustained severe lacerations on a hand and his hands, knees and feet.

The firemen's club will be campaigning in the Misouche area for articles of clothing, furniture and will probably remain in hospital for at least another day or two. He sustained severe lacerations on a hand and his hands, knees and feet.
