

# Canadian Club Plans Biennial Conference

A highlight of the annual meeting of the Canadian Club of P.E.I. held Tuesday at the Charlottetown Hotel, was the discussion of the biennial conference of the Association of Canadian Clubs to be held in 1968.

It will mark the first occasion in 16 years in which the conference will be held anywhere other than Montreal and will be the first time in history that it has been staged in Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy was appointed 1964 conference chairman, for which it is anticipated there will be as many as 100 delegates, main speaker for the big event will be Dr. Wilder Penfield, National president of the Association of Canadian Clubs.

In submitting the list of officers, the nominating committee recommended that the sections of the constitution and bylaws pertaining to the election of officers be waived for the 1964-65 year.

This would permit the officers to be elected in their posts and also ensure that continuity is maintained by the various committees that have been working for the past several months on the plans for the biennial conference.

**ALL RE-ELECTED**

The recommendation was approved and all members of the executive were re-elected. In the case of the president, W. J. Hancock, since the departure from the province of the president, A. D. Cameron, he had filled the post in an acting capacity, and last night's election confirmed him in the office.

Mr. Hancock also announced that the opening dinner meeting of the 1963-64 year will take place in September for which the executive is now seeking a special speaker.

# Magistrate Remands City Man On Possession Court

Pleading guilty before Magistrate A.J. Heston in city police court, James Gary Gormley, Charlottetown, charged with possession of stolen goods valued over \$50, was yesterday remanded for sentence until June 26.

Charles E. Lund, Charlottetown, who Tuesday was given a two-year suspended sentence for a similar offence, appeared yesterday for the execution of his bond.

Henry C. MacDonald, Parkdale, charged with assault had his case adjourned until this morning. Evidence was given by the plaintiff, Albert Jordan and by the defendant, John P. Nicholson.

One of the winners of the three-day Bantock scholarship, charged with possession of liquor, June 25, Vernon J. Dennis, fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

J. L. A. y o b i t. Dunstons, charged with driving a motor vehicle without a license pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Two other accused charged with failing to stop at a stop sign were fined \$10 and costs or five days, and \$5 and costs or two days respectively. The heavier fine was given by the plaintiff, Albert Jordan and by the defendant, John P. Nicholson.

The Freeman Foundation of N.B., charged with "neglect of an animal being conveyed" had his case adjourned until Tuesday. June 25, Vernon J. Dennis, inspector and special constable for the SPCA and St. Andrew's Church, gave evidence. The accused also testified. The case concerns a shipment of horses in which one animal had later to be destroyed due to injuries resulting from an allegedly overcrowded stock

# School Property Sale Debated in Montague

**MONTAGUE** — The sale of school property to the legion for the sum of one dollar at the annual meeting of the Montague School District which is being considered a bit in Montague.

The property in question is the old Memorial School which is considered to be of no further use to the school district and at last year's annual meeting it was suggested that the legion should have the school for the above price if no longer required.

At this year's meeting a motion to sell the school to the legion for the sum of one dollar if it were moved from the present site was defeated and a further motion to sell it to the legion was also defeated. The school board held a meeting and on three to two vote decided to call another meeting to further discuss the matter.

The legion claimed that the annual meeting was a legal one and that it was not intended to further discuss the matter. The school trustees expressed the opinion that the ground on which the school is located should be held for future expansion while the legion claims it was built as a school and is not intended to be used as a school, especially when it was the wish of most taxpayers at the annual meeting.

It is the intention of the legion to erect a monument, remove the building and to clear the grounds, and as in the past no doubt the legion will make space available for other organizations as scouts, guides and brownies.

The legion has had a deed drawn up and presented it to the school board to sign, which has been refused by the majority of the board.

The school trustees and legion executives are endeavoring to work out the problem to the satisfaction of all.
