Five Canadian Boxers Named On Empire List

LONDON (CP) — Five Canadian boxers are named as contenders for three Commonwealth titles in the first list of recognized champions and contenders issued by the reformed Commonwealth and Empire boxing championship commission.

Edward Howard of Halifax and Alvin Gault of Montreal are named as contenders for the vacant lightweight title. Yvon Durelle of Beauport, Que., is named as contender for the middleweight crown held by British boxer Turpin; and Ed Lymburn of Edmonton and James Brown of Toronto, for the heavyweight title held by tubby Don Galt of Britain.

17 Players Are Named To AHL All-Star Team

NEW YORK (CP) — Seventeen players were named Monday to the American Hockey League all-star team which will play the champion Cleveland Barons in the league's first annual all-star game at Hershey Oct. 27.

The list was announced by Murray Henderson, coach of Hershey Bears, who was chosen to pilot the All-Stars because his team was the finalist against Cleveland in last spring's Calder Cup playoffs.

Five of the All-Stars—goalie Gil Mauer and defencemen Frank Mathers of Pittsburgh, left winger Gaye Stewart and right winger Ed Slowinski of Buffalo, and right winger Dunc Fisher of Hershey—were chosen in a poll of sports reporters last spring.

Ernie Francis and Tommy Williams of Cleveland were also chosen but they will play with the Barons in the all-star game. Five other players named to the squad in the spring are no longer in the league.

To complete his roster, Henderson named the following players: Goalie Gord Henry of Buffalo; left wingers Joe Lund, Buffalo, and Obie O'Brien, Hershey; defencemen Pat Egan, Providence, Gordon Tottle and Danny Summers, Springfield; right wingers Zello Toppazzini, Providence, and Harry Pidhirny, Springfield; and centres Arnie Kullman, Hershey, Willie Marshall, Pittsburgh, Gordon Pennell, Buffalo and Chuck Scherza, Providence.

Record Breaking Flying Farmer Heads For Home

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — Delbert A. Puhlmann, the Utah flying farmer, headed for home Monday after a record flight for light planes. He hopes next year to make an aerial jaunt over Russia.

Such a trip would be made as a flying tourist, and he plans to ask the Russian embassy in Washington to help him plan it. He would file a plane overseas and begin the flight in Europe.

The plane he bought second-hand ran perfectly on the record 2,800-mile, non-stop flight from Victoria, B. C., to Key West, where he landed Saturday after 24 hours and 25 minutes aloft.

He had 30 gallons of gasoline left when he landed here Saturday and could have gone on to Cuba, but had no map of the island and decided against landing there.

He claimed the flight considerably bettered the previous light plane record from Los Angeles to New York in 1951.

Urges New Police Force In Canada

MONTREAL (CP) — A retired Scotland Yard superintendent Monday urged establishment of a national detective force with the right to invade any Canadian jurisdiction to combat crime.

In an interview, Robert Fabian said: "Why should a small town... be hoodwinked by the underworld because the small communities lack facilities and funds?"

He suggested a force complementary to the RCMP and provincial police, "whose hands are tied in many instances at the present time."

Fabian, better known as "Fabian of the Yard" and now a private investigator, is en route to Toronto where he will deliver a series of lectures, with the proceeds going to help victims of hurricane Hazel.

Gavilon Predicts Easy Win Over Johnny Saxton

SUMMIT, N.J. (AP) — Kid Gavilon sees nothing but trouble ahead for Johnny Saxton, the New York Negro who will try to lift his world welterweight title Wednesday night at Philadelphia.

"He has two serious cases," said Gavilon Monday at his training camp. "On Wednesday he comes to my court and on Thursday in traffic court. But first he may go to hospital."

Gavilon referred to Saxton's trouble with the law as a "scot-flaw" for ignoring traffic violations in New York. He is scheduled to go to jail for 15 days starting Thursday morning.

"Maybe he give me trouble five rounds," said Gavilon. "I fight all styles fighters. I know what I do. But I want to know what he can do. After five rounds, I found out. Then it will be like Johnny Bratton at Chicago. Maybe he go to hospital before he go to jail."

Royal Art Of Self Defence

From London, (Eng.) Bureau of Thomson Newspapers LONDON — Prince Charles began taking boxing lessons at Buckingham Palace this week—no more proof that his parents intend him to live the life of a normal healthy youngster.

This winter the Duke of Edinburgh is arranging some football practice for his son, probably at the royal family's country residence at Sandringham, Norfolk, where the late King George Sixth and his brothers learned the game as boys playing with the sons of local farmers and estate workers.

Swimming lessons are planned for next spring in the luxuriously fitted swimming pool at Buckingham Palace. And it is in this part of the building that a boxing ring of the young prince has been fitted up.

NEW YORK (AP) — Police Commissioner Francis W. H. Adams says the crime situation in the city has not improved since August when he reported New York was "on the verge of becoming a community of violence and crime."

"In many areas of the city it is worse," he said Sunday. New York is still "verging on becoming a city of crime and violence," Adams said, despite what he called "terrific efforts" by the police department and the active interest of Mayor Robert F. Wagner and his administration.
