HUNTERS' CORNER

Cast Of Tracks Suggest N.B. Panther In Province

Early this week I was shown a 'cast' of the tracks of the, as yet, unidentified, mysterious animal that has been roaming the countryside in the general Fredericton district. They were five and one half inches long and five inches wide. They resembled enormous dog tracks, only an approximate four times as large as any dog we have in this province. It is this columnist's guess that we have a New Brunswick panther in the province. Bruce Wright, well known naturalist with the N.B. Government, claims this is so. They have been identified by both tracks and sight, according to reliable information. Strange as it may appear this announcement by Mr. Wright some years ago did not surprise me in the least.

The incident that prompted this thought was one that occurred in the early 1920s. Abner B. Belyea, an old First Great War buddy of mine, now living in Fredericton, N.B., invited me to Gagetown for a moose hunt. Billy Kelly, a resident of the U.S. who was vacationing with relatives in Gagetown, accompanied us. The area selected was a huge forest wilderness north and east of Gagetown. Sections of it had been logged long years back and this was dotted with dense swampy sections. We drove as far as we could over old logging roads in a Model T. car and after that walked miles... maybe seven or eight... to an old logging camp. Abner was quite familiar with the area and had hunted there before.

At the site of these 'salt licks' located in a rough triangle an approx one half mile apart, sturdy platforms had been constructed an approximate ten feet from the ground. The huge limbs of the ancient spruce were the base on which the platforms were built. Incidentally, we didn't build them... this chore was done long years before we invaded this domain.

With the Winchester 30-30 across my knees and my back against the tree trunk I made myself comfortable and waited patiently for a deer or moose to come for a lick of salt. In front of me I could make out the dim outline of the trail that led to the salt licks. I suddenly saw a black spot. It took some seconds to realize that it was a black spot. As I swung the rifle to my shoulder the black-out vanished and the glimmer of light from the night sky was more visible. Later by flashlight Abner pointed out the tracks of a moose that had been headed for the 'lick'. It had moved without a sound.

But, to get back to the 'point' of this narrative... 2 a.m. ... the hour when man's vitality is at its lowest ebb... showed on my luminous watch dial as I awoke from a short 'cat nap'. The pre-meval forest felt sort of foreboding and at this moment I heard Kelly open up from his hide with rapid fire action... five shots as fast as he could pull the trigger. As the echoes faded into no-harm-no-pain-as-usually-scream up the night a few hundred yards to my left. Scream followed scream, and not all in the same key. My first impression was that a woman lost in this wilderness was making her presence known and calling for help. The screams died out in a sort of throaty gurgle in a matter of seconds and I knew then it was some animal that had been disturbed by Kelly's fusillade of shots. I felt certain at the time it was a panther that screamed and now I am sure of it. I asked Kelly what he fired at and his reply really shook me up. 'Just before I decided to come down off the tree I heard something moving beneath it and I fired the shots to scare whatever it was away.' Maybe it was a good idea at that.

Canadian Swimmer Sherry Shatters World Record

BLACKPOOL, England (CP) Dan Sherry, 19-year-old Hamilton, Ont. swimmer, set a world record of 58.1 seconds for the men's 110-yard butterfly event at the British Swimming Championships Thursday. Sherry, a high school student who represented Canada at the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo, broke the listed world mark of 59 seconds set by Australian Kevin Berry in Sydney in January, 1963. Sherry's record swim came after an earlier brush with British officials over a disputed warm-up swim in the pools. Sherry was followed by Ron Jacks, 17-year-old Winnipeg swimmer who also was an Olympic competitor, second in 1:01.8 and by Tommy Arusoo, 17, of Montreal, third in 1:01.5.
