

**TWIN SISTER
GIVES KIDNEY**

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Pretty 15-year-old twin girls who look out for each other were reported doing well here after one donated a kidney to the other in an effort to save her life.

Doctors said they would possibly know within three days whether Janice Ottenbacher of Richmond, Mich., will be able to resume a normal life.

She and her blonde twin, Joan, were side by side in a room at University Hospital, where doctors worked 15 hours Monday to transplant a kidney from Joan to Janice.

Knowing it was her sister's only chance for life, Joan insisted on the transplant.

**Lakes' Peace
Seen Possible**

MONTREAL (CP)—The possibility of labor peace on the Great Lakes this summer appears to be improving.

Charles Millard—one of the federal maritime trustees who has been meeting with Paul Hall, president of the Seafarers' International Union of North America—said here the talks were conducted in a spirit of cooperation and the points at issue between the trustees and the SIU are very small.

Mr. Millard said the talks will resume late this week but no specific date had been set. He talked with Mr. Hall for some 15 hours a week ago and they met again for 13 hours last Thursday. A statement had been planned following Thursday's session, but Mr. Millard said this was postponed at the request of the SIU leader.

In Toronto, meanwhile, the Upper Lakes Shipping Company announced it will not send its vessel John Ericsson into Chicago harbor this week as planned—a move that might have touched off trouble while talks were still in progress. The company gave no reason for the delay.

**CN Suffers
Loss In Feb.**

MONTREAL (CP)—Canadian National Railway has announced it suffered a net loss in this railway operation of \$41,000 in February, compared with a loss of \$2,757,000 in February, 1963.

Revenues were \$90,116,000 and expenses \$90,457,000. In February last year revenues were \$54,448,000 and expenses \$56,205,000.

The net loss for the first two months of this year was \$28,000 compared to \$8,988,000 in January and February of 1963.

The 1964 revenues include \$2,400,000 for February and \$1,900,000 for both January and February covering the amount estimated to be receivable from the federal government for interest payments related to the recommendations of the MacDermion royal commission on transportation.

**12-Mile Limit
Talks Are Set**

OSLO (AP)—A spokesman for the Norwegian foreign ministry said here Norway will get in touch with the Canadian government soon to discuss effects of Canada's planned 12-mile fishery boundary on Norwegian fisheries and seal catching.

Tor Myklebust, assistant secretary of foreign affairs for information, said that it is not yet known when the negotiations will start but that it probably will be in the relatively near future.

There has been contact between the Canadian authorities and the Norwegian embassy in Ottawa about the matter, but the realities of the situation have not been discussed yet, Myklebust said. He added Norway may attempt to get some kind of transitional arrangement.

Norway catches seals for about 7,000,000 kroner (\$1,000,000) in Canadian waters annually. The areas vary, but some of them will be inside the 12-mile limit.

Canadian Fisheries Minister H. J. Robichaud said in the Commons March 25 preliminary discussions took place in mid-March with representatives of the Norwegian government.

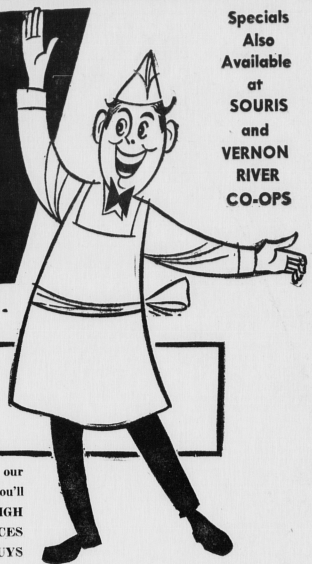
He said Canadian officials will meet Thursday with a delegation from Portugal and center April 7 and 8 with representatives of the French government. Initial negotiations were completed with the United States in mid-February.

Mr. Robichaud has refused to give any details of negotiations with foreign countries while talks are taking place.
