SIXES cases of drunkenness were disposed of by the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning. Two offenders were fined \$20 each.

DOWNED.—Charles F. Harrison, of St. John, N. B., fell overboard from a catamaran, while sailing at Long Reach, on Friday last, and was drowned.

POMPEY GRHAM, of Montgomery, N. Y., died on the 28th ult., aged 119 years. He had a distinct recollection of incidents and personages of his youth. He had his second wife long before Washington's death, and afterwards married a third. He enjoyed good health up to the time of his death.

WEIGHT.—The Ottawa Sun says five lady visitors to the city met by accident in the members' lobby of the House of Commons, this morning, whose combined weight could not have been less than 1,000 lbs. There were three in one party and two in another, and as they passed they mutually admired each other.

CAMIL, a half-witted fellow, who has been a source of trouble to the people of Moncton, was sent to Summerside. He arrived in charge of Mr. Geo. Thomas, on Saturday evening. The man, Ferguson, who jumped from a train on the All Rail Line last week, was also a passenger by the boat on Saturday.

JUDGE PETERS is to-day engaged hearing the claim of the Dominion Government against the liquidators of the Bank of P. E. Island. The argument so far has rested solely on the question whether or not the Queen is entitled to be paid her claim in full over and above, and before all other creditors. The Dominion Government is represented by E. J. Hodgson, Q. C., the liquidators by Messrs. Fitzgerald, Q. C., and F. Peters.

SUICIDE AT THE ASYLUM.—Mrs. Crowden, of Dorchester, for some weeks a patient in the lunatic asylum, St. John, N. B., was found on Thursday last suspended by the neck from the top of the grating of the window shutter which formed the ventilator to her room. A bed sheet had been utilized by the patient to carry out her purpose. Every precaution possible had been taken, the authorities say, to guard from harm the deceased, of whose suicidal intentions they had been warned when she entered the institution.—Sun.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT FALL RIVER.—On Monday night last, Mrs. George Taylor, an aged and heavy lady residing at Fall River, a few miles beyond Bedford, met with an accident which resulted fatally. She had retired to her room for the night, and it is thought must have started to go down stairs again when she fell. The fall aroused others of the family, and Mrs. T. was found lying at the foot of the stairs insensible. Medical assistance was summoned, but did not arrive till after she had expired, four hours subsequent to the fall. Her skull had been fractured. Her remains were interred Wednesday afternoon.—H. Chronicle.

We understand that Mr. Thomas Galloway, of Uxbridge, Ontario, who has been travelling in the Maritime Provinces, for his health, and is at present visiting our city, will deliver a lecture on "The Unseen Battlefield," in the Brick Methodist Church to-morrow evening at eight o'clock. Though the lecturer has been long and severely afflicted, and is disabled for life, yet he is a man of marvellous pluck and energy. His lectures have delighted thousands in the towns and cities of Ontario and New Brunswick. As both the press and the clergy speak in the highest terms of his ability as a lecturer, a treat may be expected. He will also deliver a lecture on "Prayer," in Zion Presbyterian Church, on Wednesday, at the same hour. No admission will be charged, but at the close of each lecture, the audience will be given an opportunity of expressing their appreciation.

S. S. CONVENTION OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.—The executive committee of the Sunday School Convention of the Maritime Provinces announce that arrangements are being made to hold the 14th annual meeting in Yarmouth, on Sept 25th and following days, the Yarmouth people having extended to them a cordial invitation. The nature and scope of future efforts will depend in a great measure upon the action of this convention. The committee urge the attendance of their fellow-workers from all parts of the Maritime Provinces. In addition to pastors and superintendents (who are ex-officio members), the convention consists of at least one delegate from each Sunday school throughout the Maritime Provinces. Arrangements will be made for reduced fares on main routes of travel to delegates attending the convention. Sunday school workers who propose to be present are advised to notify the secretary, Jas. Forrest, at Halifax, not later than Sept. 10th in order that arrangements may be made for their entertainment at Yarmouth.

ALD. DENNISON, a captain in the Governor General's Body Guard, at Toronto, has been appointed in command of the Canadian voyagers in the Nile expedition.

WRITING to the Wolfville (N. S.) Acadian, a correspondent says:—Three years ago Elias Boutcher, of Port Williams, planted eleven currant bushes, and this year picked one hundred quarts of superior fruit, and sold them at ten cents per quart. Now, as 2,800 bushels can be set on one acre, the yield would be 28,000 quarts, worth \$2,800. What crop can beat this for profit? a clear profit, above all cost of bushes and labor, of \$2,000 in three years.

WE are indebted to Mr. R. K. Brace for a copy of the Exhibition Prize List for the Counties of Pictou, Antigonish and Guysborough. The Exhibition is to be held at New Glasgow, N. S., on September 30th, October 1st and 2nd. The total amount of the prizes offered is \$2,545.75. Competition is open to all Nova Scotia, and no charge is made for the entry of exhibits. Attached to the prize list is a form to be filled by intending exhibitors, with a statement of the article or animal to be exhibited and the class or section to which it belongs, with other particulars.

The heaviest storm in many years visited Manitoba on the 29th ult. The rain poured in torrents and the lightning was very vivid. Several houses were blown down, their foundations, sheds were blown down, sidewalks torn up, and the fronts of houses blown off. The lightning struck the Hudson Bay company's storehouse, Winnipeg, and ripping up the roof did damage to the extent of \$10,000. In Healdsburg the English church, was blown down, several houses moved off their foundations and grain stacks levelled to the ground and scattered over the prairie. Reports from other country districts show that the storm raged from Vermillion Bay on the east to Brandon on the west, but that the severity of the storm centered in Winnipeg. A great deal of grain was lodged in some localities, but in others little or no damage was done. The wind blew at such a terrific rate as to blow streets cars off the track in Winnipeg. This is the first big storm in many years which has visited Manitoba.
