MONTAGUE—Philip Murphy, a native of Sturgeon, is 99 years old today and looks forward with great anticipation to his 100th year.

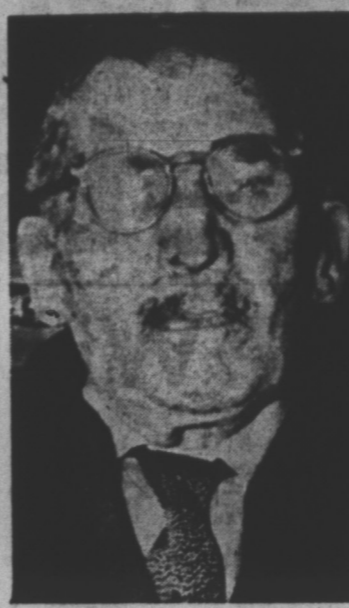
