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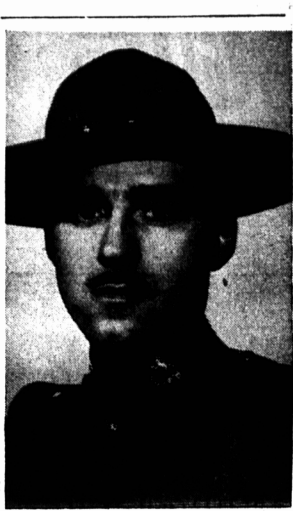
CST. STUNDEN LEAVES TO TAKE TRAFFIC SPECIALISTS' COURSE

Cst. R. M. Stunden has just left Charlottetown to take an advanced course for traffic specialists at North Western University, Chicago, Ill., U.S.A. Cst. Stunden is one of eight R.C.M.P. members selected from all over Canada to take this advanced training.

This is the second advanced course to be taken by Cst. Stunden, the first being at Vancouver, B. C. in the spring of 1954. Cst. Stunden is in charge of the "L" Division Special Highway Traffic Squad and is a specialist in traffic for R.C.M.P. in the Province. His advanced training is in line with the new R.C.M.P. Highway Traffic program planned at Headquarters, Ottawa, relating to Highway Traffic enforcement and education.

The program includes specialized training at central points for all traffic patrol men and the development of personnel in that work throughout their Police career. As well, provision is made for certain selected members taking University training in traffic work from time to time, and for their employment on their return to their Divisions in the planning and organization of Police traffic operations in their respective Provinces.

The program also includes experimentation and testing of the latest modern devices in Highway Traffic enforcement with a view to the standardization of equipment on R.C.M.P. Highway Traffic cars and motorcycles across Canada. At present, experimentation is being carried out with radar devices, special cameras, and other recommended equipment to establish whether it is practical and useful for standardization in R.C.M.P. service across the country.



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New School Being Built At Fort Augustus; Will Be Ready Shortly

The new elementary school under construction at Fort Augustus will probably be ready for occupation early in the new year, according to a progress report from W. W. Downie, who inspected the job this week.

The building, which is of brick face construction, has a foundation of reinforced concrete, supporting steel beams carrying the floors and roof. The building will be completely insulated and the windows are designed to meet modern schoolroom specifications. Tile and linoleum will be used throughout, following a color scheme of green. When the school is completed, the entire area in the vicinity will be terraced and landscaped to bring added beauty to the utility of the new building. Provision is also made for a spacious recreation area in the rear of the school which is expected to become the centre of much activity. The work is being done by ten or twelve local men under competent supervision and regular inspection.

MISS JOHNSTON RETURNS FROM ATTENDING SEMINAR IN ATHENS

Miss Frances E. Johnston, director of the Art Centre in Charlottetown, has returned to the Province after an absence of more than three months spent in Europe visiting museums and art galleries and enquiring into their educational programs for children and adults. During July and August she visited England, Ireland, Scotland, France and Sweden. September was spent in Italy and Greece and the first week of October was used to visit London and look up documents in the Public Record Office in connection with the first ten years of Prince Edward Island's history as a British colony.

While in Greece, Miss Johnston spent two weeks attending the Second Unesco Seminar on "The Role of Museums in Education" and was the only Canadian to go to Athens for this seminar. One other Canadian was able to be present during some of the sessions. This was Mrs. T. W. L. MacDermot, wife of the Canadian ambassador in Athens.

Even in September the temperature in Athens was still so high that the seminar group was unable to have any afternoon sessions and held all of its sessions from 8:30 to 1:30 in the morning and from 5:30 to 8:30 in the afternoon.

WIDE REPRESENTATION

Some thirty countries were represented at the seminar with approximately forty-five persons participating. A special effort had been made on the part of the Museums and Monuments Division of Unesco, which organized the seminar, to encourage the countries bordering the Mediterranean to send representatives, for the museums in these countries have been primarily concerned with acquiring and conserving objects and

Dominion Drama Festival Director Speaks Here

A most appreciative audience of theatrically minded people attended a public meeting at City Hall last night to hear an informal talk by Mr. Richard MacDonald, Director of the Dominion Drama Festival, Ottawa. Judge H. L. Palmer presided.

Mr. MacDonald expressed his pleasure at making his fifth trip to the Island. He said "It was just like coming home." Mr. MacDonald told of his trip to Great Britain and how he enjoyed seeing 24 visiting museums and art galleries in London and Edinburgh and was privileged to see "Midsummer Night's Dream" and "MacBeth" played by the Old Victorian Players.

While in the United Kingdom, Mr. MacDonald attended the Council of International Amateur Theatre Association Groups which he found terrifically interesting. About 14 countries were represented and the Dominion Drama Festival, which has recently become a member, may be invited to take a one-act play abroad. In Paris he saw three plays and visited back stage. He was amazed to find the very old fashioned methods of scene shifting that were used in the French Capital.

Mr. MacDonald told his audience that some thought was being given to the awarding of a scholarship that would make it possible for an outstanding theatrical group to make a tour of Canada. He said that something definite might be worked out along these lines in the near future.

In the discussion that took place following the meeting Mr. MacDonald was most co-operative in answering all questions asked of him. A request to demonstrate the make-up required for a young man taking the part of an older man was quickly complied with by Mr. MacDonald and the results produced brought rounds of applause. Judge Palmer on behalf of those present heartily thanked Mr. MacDonald for a most instructive and enjoyable evening.

LEAVES FOR WEST WITH LARGE SHIPMENT OF CHOICE P.E.I. HOGS

"Prince Edward Island swine breeders should well consider their breeding programs in which they maintain the Island stock", said Dr. Stanley L. Curtis of the Department of Agriculture, Province of Saskatchewan, who yesterday left for the West with 72 choice Island hogs ranging in ages from two to four months.

The hogs shipped were assembled after a careful selection from well known breeders throughout the Island had been made by Dr. Curtis assisted by members of the Federal Livestock Production Branch here. Breeders contributing to the shipment were Messrs. Almona Boswell, Marshfield; Herman Mayne, Emerald; Fred Matheson, St. Peter's Bay; MacCormack Bros., St. Georges; Ivan Pickering, Kennington; Oliver Meek, French River; Russell Buell, Abney; Chester Whiteway, Murray Valley; Frank MacInnis, Cherry Valley; Kenneth MacNeill, Clyde River; Milton Rackham, Wheatley River; David Wright, Lower Montague; Arthur Paynter, French River; Malcolm Lamont, Bonshaw; Borden Boswell, Charlottetown, R. R. 3; Rowell Boswell, Charlottetown, R.R. 3.

The shipment of pure bred stock will be distributed among forty Saskatchewan farmers but four young boars which will go to Dr. L. M. Winters of the University of Minnesota in St. Paul. Dr. Winters is world famous for his cross-breeding with livestock and is probably the first to use "hybrid vigor" in his crosses which is a parallel to work done with hybrid corn.

Comments Uniformity
One thing noted by Dr. Curtis while visiting the swine herds of the Province was the uniformity of type which he says is characteristic of Island hogs. Dr. Curtis has been sent here with the co-operation of the Saskatchewan Government in the hope that the western province will be able to raise the standard of grade hogs marketed, which at the present time is averaging about 23%.

"Since Prince Edward Island hogs are maintaining a grade of well over 50%, we felt that this was the most logical place to come if we were going to make an improvement along this line," said he.

After the hogs, over 50 of which have A. R. records of more than 90, have been placed with Saskatchewan farmers, the Department of Agriculture will help them in making selections for breeding stock and continuing with advanced registry testing and the placing of extreme bacon type among commercial breeders.

Federal Department officials who co-operated with Dr. Curtis in making his selection were Harold Clay and Jim Mundy. Dr. R. S. MacDonald administered the required veterinary services such as inoculations, blood tests etc.

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P.E.I. Man Dies At Arlington, Mass.

Word has been received of the death yesterday at Arlington, Mass., of Gordon W. MacLeod formerly of Kinross, in his 49th year. He had been unwell for several months.

Mr. MacLeod had been in the United States for more than 20 years. He was the son of Mrs. Angus A. MacLeod and the late Mr. MacLeod.

Other survivors include his wife, the former Mabel MacLeod of Peter's Road, P.E.I., and a son and daughter. Four brothers also survive. They are: Willard at Kinross; Alistair and Sinclair in Charlottetown; and Everett in Vancouver.

Funeral services and burial will be at Arlington.
