Jr. Player Dies Of Hockey Injuries



Victim of a fatal injury in an OHA Junior "C" playoff game between Collingwood and Aurora, defenceman Robert Gilles, 17, of Stayner died of a skull fracture and hemorrhage. The accident occurred when, with four minutes to go in the game, Gilles, a Collingwood defenceman, was crashed into the boards by several Aurora players in a race for the puck. The fatal accident coincides with the death of 17-year-old Ken Cox of Winnipeg during a game at Lockport, Man. Veteran hockey officials believe these are the first hockey fatalities in 50 years.

The R. C. A. 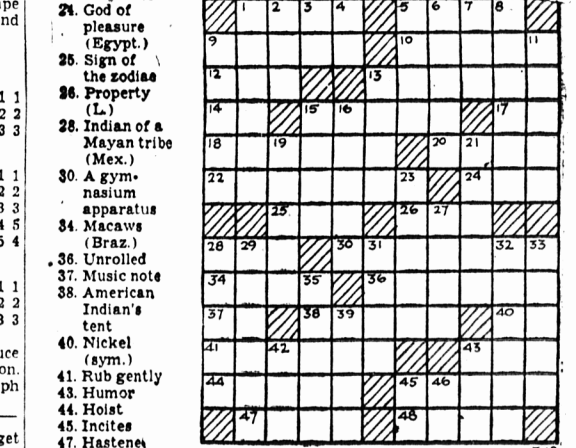
