

# Summerside Aces Defeat Montague Primroses 12-5

# Pompey And Hinnant Fight 10-Round Draw At Chicago

CHICAGO (AP)—Sixth-ranked Yulian Pompey of Trinidad and the third-ranked Clarence Hinnant of Miami fought to a rugged 10-round draw in a televised 10-round light heavyweight bout at the Chicago Stadium Wednesday night.

It was a brutal fight, with both men to finish, even though there were no knockdowns.

voted for Pompey, 47 to 46; Judge Lou Capparelli voted for Hinnant, 47 to 46; the referee called it even, 47-47. The AP saw it for Pompey, 47-48.

The bout was scored under the five-point split system with five points to a round winner and one lesser number to a round loser.

Pompey weighed 161½ pounds and Hinnant 215.

Both fighters were trading bombs every round but neither ever was in serious trouble.

Although there was a lot of stiff fighting, the referee didn't have to separate the two main battles more than a few times.

The two, both boasting impressive knockout records, went at it especially hard in the first four rounds. After that, Hinnant went to boxing more at long range but he never backed away from any rally by Pompey.

Referee Weissman gave Pompey four rounds, the third, fourth, fifth and seventh, and awarded the eighth and ninth to Hinnant with three rounds even.

Judge Capparelli gave Hinnant five rounds—the second, fifth, sixth, eighth and ninth—while Pompey won the third, fourth and seventh, and called the first even.

Judge Marovitz gave each fighter three rounds and called four a draw.

Hinnant was warned for a low punch in the first round in which Pompey landed a solid right to the jaw.

In the second round, Hinnant drubbed Pompey sharply with both fists before Pompey landed in the third with a whistling left to the jaw which jarred Hinnant.

Hinnant began retreating but boxing effectively in the fourth. In the next two rounds, both dealt a number of punishing body blows.

# Turkey Wars Of N. E. Threat

PARIS (AP)—Turkey outlined at the NATO summit conference Tuesday the grave nature of the Middle East situation and called for reinforcing both the NATO and Baghdad Pacts.

Turkish Foreign Minister Fatih Rishi Zorlu spoke in broad terms of the Communist threat as a result of the Syrian crisis. He also called for closer association between NATO and the Baghdad Pact. Turkey belongs to both alliances.

Premier Adnan Menderes told the conference that NATO would be wrong to regard the Syrian problem and therefore the whole Middle East situation, as a question that does not directly interest NATO.

Menderes added: "We are convinced that one of the main causes of the setbacks we have experienced in the Middle East is the fact that the Baghdad Pact has not been sufficiently reinforced."

# Wants Canadian Control In Insurance Field

OTTAWA (CP)—Superintendent of insurance K. R. MacGregor said Tuesday that "it is terrible to see what some common sense people are up to against their own country."

MacGregor told the Senate banking committee that outside interests were after control of Canadian companies in mind in many cases.

He urged the passage of a bill calling for changes in the Canadian and British Insurance Companies Act which would give the companies keep control in Canada.

The committee approved the government bill as passed by the Commons Dec. 12. The bill requires the majority of an insurance company's directors to be Canadian citizens. It also provides for mutualization of stock companies.

Mr. MacGregor said six Canadian companies came under foreign control in recent years. He said the bill would affect 29 of Canada's 32 insurance companies which do 70 per cent of the country's insurance business.

# Boxing Day Not C. S. Holiday

OTTAWA (CP)—State Secretary Fairclough said Tuesday that Boxing Day—the day after Christmas—will not be a holiday for federal civil servants.

He said in reply to a Commons question by Erhart Reizer (CCF-Burnaby-Comitau) that civil servants will receive a half-day holiday the day before Christmas and another half-day on the day after New Year's.

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# Two Magazines Fined \$5,000

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A judge Wednesday found Confidential and Whisper magazines guilty of obscenity and fined each \$5,000.

The case against the sister seasonal publications was submitted on the transcript of a 10-day, 11-times sensational trial last summer which ended in a hung jury.

After the trial, charges against the magazines were dropped. The magazines agreed to come public on obscenity-type stories.

The judge said the magazines had not been sufficiently reinforced.

# New York Rangers Defeat Montreal Canadiens 5-4

NEW YORK (CP)—The New York Rangers came from behind with three goals in the first period and added another Montreal in the last two periods to edge Montreal Canadiens 5-4 in a thrilling National Hockey League game Wednesday night at Madison Square Garden. Camille Henry led the New York attack with two goals including the winning one.

The Rangers also won a dilly Corwall of 2 Hull-Otawa 6 of a fight which broke out in a goal-scoring lead with 16, flicked the winning marker with only 11 minutes remaining.

Andy Bathgate, Andy Heberton and Danny Lewicki were the other New York scorers. The victory boosted second place New York within seven points of first place Montreal. It also was the Rangers' third straight win over the Canadiens on Garden ice.

Those losses represent the sum total of Montreal defeats away from home this season.

Rookie Gene A. Aebychnik, playing in his first game after his call-up to replace injured Jean Beliveau, played brilliantly, scoring once and assisting on two other Montreal goals. Don Marshall, Bert Olmstead, and Bernie Geoffroy were the other Montreal scorers.
