He observed that the Federal Government last year had a surplus of \$382,000,000, "and now they are cutting out the Provincial Treasurer's cheque for a measly million. If they were having difficulty at Ottawa, it would be different," he said.

"Something will have to be done," said Mr. Bell. "You will have to have someone from the Opposition go with you. We in the Opposition will co-operate in whatever way possible."

SUGGESTS MINISTER RESIGN Mr. Bell recalled that during the draft address he had pointed out that in 1951 everything was going well in the Department of Education, "but now everything has blown up," he added.

He claimed that things were not being well handled and suggested that there was trouble brewing within the Department. "From what I have observed as a private citizen, I do not believe that the Minister has the faith and the following of the teachers in this Province and I believe he should resign," said the Opposition Leader.

"We note that things are not going in the Department. The people who have come to this chamber in such large crowds did not come to listen to the legislators they came to hear what was being said at the educational hearings. A lot of people are wondering why all this flurry and worry should be going on in the Department. I am sure that a committee will work out some of these difficulties that have arisen since 1955," said Mr. Bell.

INDUSTRIAL PROMOTION Mr. Bell recalled that two or three years ago two and a half million dollars was voted for industrial promotion in the Province. This money was not opposed to industrial promotion but noted that a large portion, in the vicinity of \$165,000, had been loaned to a firm in Souris.

He said he had heard a lot from the Souris member of what great things these Souris firms were doing. "I hope you had heard a word. He understood that one firm was in competition with the other. 'We have voted a half a million dollars and if we have thrown this money away, we will have to answer for it,' he said.

Mr. Bell said he understood that one firm was having trouble marketing its product and he could imagine he could hear that firm say, "we know we owe you money but you allowed another firm to come into competition with us so you can wait."

The Opposition Leader spoke about the proposed Heeneey plant in Sherwood. "Here we have another outfit asking for two or three hundred thousand. We want to encourage industry but we have to be careful."

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION Turning to rural electrification Mr. Bell said the cost to the people had been excessive but most people were so anxious to get electric power that they did not complain about the cost. He noted that one community in his district had been promised electric power before the last election but suggested that the people did not vote the right way with the result that they are still waiting.

He qualified his remarks by naming the district that of Wheatley River to New Glasgow. The Opposition Leader said he was sorry the Provincial Treasurer had seen fit to increase the gasoline tax.
