MR. GEORGE HEDLEY CROSBY

The death took place in Elkhorn, Manitoba, Sunday, March 12th, of an Island-born man in the person of George Hedley Crosby.

Mr. Crosby was the last member of the family of the late George and Mrs. Crosby (nee Nancy Wright) Bedeque, P. E. I. He was born in Freetown, P. E. I., Aug. 24th, 1864.
