City's Developed Area Extended Two Blocks

Two blocks will be added to the city's built up area according to plans approved at the regular August meeting of Charlottetown City Council.

Through a resolution sponsored by Councillors Arsenault and Haslam, Council approved an extension to both Oriear and Summer streets, which when completed will have the effect of extending the present limits of Oriear one block north and Summer Street one block east.

All land owners were asked to make the necessary land available "in early course."

Councillor Arsenault, chairman of the sewerage and water committee also announced that all work on sewers and on the sea wall is expected to be completed by fall. He noted that the sea wall, which is phase three of the Spring Park drainage project, is between one-half and three-quarters completed.

Other resolutions approved at the meeting, in which all councillors were present except Councillors Foster and Gormley, were the extending of a contract of County Construction Company for the laying of the combined sewer system to include the area of John Street; and that the eastern section of Grafton from the main railway crossing be fully paved with 22 foot traffic surface and two 10 foot aprons as part of the Trans-Canada Highway.

Among letters read as part of communications was a letter from Robert L. Cotton thanking the council for the silver tray which was presented to him by the Council and the Kinsmen Club for donating the necessary land for the DesBrisay Crescent Playgrounds.

A letter from Frank VanDerstine, of the City Water Department stated that the installation of water on Nassau Street would be included in the program for next spring.

A letter received from W. R. Brennan, public utilities commission, stated that the commission has no objection to the installation of a marine terminal on the Marine Wharf, as long as the necessary precautions are carried out.

The chairman of the streets committee, Councillor O'Neill, stated in his report that the new sidewalk program has begun in Ward Six which includes work being carried out on Elm Ave., Young Street, Allen Street, Upper Queen Street, Upper Prince Street, Eden Street and School Street.

Also in the Ward Six area, Councillor O'Neill stated that 12 catch basins have been installed on Upper Prince Street and that the men are now working on Young Street.

In the report of the police committee, presented by Councillor Baker in the absence of Councillor Gormley, the members of the city police force were given high praise for the work they did in connection with the Royal Tour.

Rotary Club Meets At Farm For Rural-Urban Field Day

Rural-urban relations were the focus yesterday when the Charlottetown Rotary Club joined forces with the Experimental Farm staff under Farm Superintendent Bob Parent, past president of the club, in the special field day program, making the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the farm.

The rural guests, ladies and gentlemen, represented a cross section of the 50 or more active organizations throughout the country, enjoyed the experience of attending the routine Rotary meeting which was conducted by President Gerry Hartien, and Mr. Parent jointly.

The luncheon, which was served in a large marquee to upwards of 200 persons by the dining-room staff of the Charlottetown Hotel under direction of Miss Inez Shaw, head waitress, was prepared under the supervision of Chef Alfred Trainor.

"Community bounds have been widened so that no longer is anyone in this province isolated," president Hartien said as he welcomed the rural guests and commended Dr. R.C. Fisher, Rotary chairman of rural-urban relations on his activity in this important subject.

Mr. Parent also expressed pleasure at the representative turn-out and extended an invitation to all, to adjourn to the main tent and hear the guest speaker, Hon. Douglas Scott Harkness, federal minister of agriculture and others, for the unveiling of the cairn commemorating the 50th anniversary of the inauguration of the Experimental Farm at such rate of pay.

"There must be present in work of this kind, a genuine interest and a desire to create and discover and a willingness to give of one's best beyond the mere call of paid duty."

It is evident from the volume and value of successes that have been marked up to the record of the Charlottetown Experimental Farm that we have been singularly fortunate in the staff and equally perhaps that the staff has been singularly happy in its projects.

NEW BRANCH
He touched briefly on the re-organization efforts of the Department under which the work of the former experimental farm service and the science service have been formed into a new research branch with unified direction to all research activities.

Looking back over the past 50 years, Mr. Harkness said that a half a century ago the main interest of farming was horses, hay and oats. "Crops were lush and nobody bothered about fertilizers," he said.

Then came the day of the silver foxes and after this the potatoes and turnips. A great deal of occupied farm land was abandoned. The need for replenishing the soil became apparent.

"The experimental farm has done a great deal in convincing the farmer that the land must be cared for if it was to feed the people. I understand that today, upwards of 2 million dollars is spent annually on commercial fertilizer."

Enumerating some of the forms of assistance which the federal government provides to farmers, Mr. Harkness said \$400,000 was paid in subsidy on feed grain imported to the province. The sum of \$35,000 was provided for farm improvement in the province and under the Maritime Freight rates act, it is estimated that \$300,000 was of direct benefit to P. E. I. in the past 12 months and half of this amount was for agriculture.

Veteran's Ringcraft Used To Polish Entry

Edison B. Mutch of North River will not show his Jersey herd at the Provincial Exhibition this year but this fact will not keep the veteran showman and premier exhibitor from playing an important part behind the scenes.

For over 30 years Mr. Mutch has been one of the top contenders at the exhibition, but as he puts it himself, "Old age and doctor's orders" have forced him to accept a less active role.

This year he will give of his valuable experience and reveal many "tricks of the trade" to the breeders in the preparation of their animals for the ring.

What keeps an exhibitor coming to the exhibition year after year? Surely there is a lot of work and care involved and a breeder is not always sure of being in the money?

OF WINNING
To this question the longtime arsey showman said the chief satisfaction comes from having one of his animals win in close competition. "To win in poor competition means nothing, but when you are able to beat some of the top notchers in the Maritimes or in Canada, you really have something to stick out your chest about," said Mr. Mutch.

No one perhaps could speak with greater authority on this subject than the North River breeder because he has won two grand championships at the Royal in two consecutive years.

In 1954 his herd sire, "Jester's standard Dreamer" took the senior grand at the Royal and the following year another bull from the Mutch farm, "Edgela Bea-

con Jester" duplicated this feat. A year later in 1956 he was win even greater prominence when a two year-old heifer, "River North Pansy's Bright" topped the Jersey sale of stars following the Royal Winter Fair. This young animal brought an exceptionally high price of \$4,500.

family in its struggle to bring about a better standard of living for those who wrest their living from the soil.

Mayor Johnstone said that, important as the Farm may be to the rural folk of the province, its strategic importance to the City of Charlottetown has been greatly appreciated.

"The farm has played an important part in the life of Charlottetown and I think particularly of the former and present superintendents who are with us today," he said.

The guest speaker was introduced by his Cabinet colleague, Hon. J. Angus MacLean. In reviewing Mr. Harkness' biography, Mr. MacLean said he was the son of a farmer who was noted as a breeder of fine horses in Ontario.

As a youth, Mr. Harkness moved to the province of Alberta where today he is engaged in a farm operation by remote control.
