MR. SCHREIBER has left Ottawa for Winnipeg. The daily mortality by cholera at Manila is three hundred.

MR. MATRICE O'NEIL, the proprietor of the "Moncton Hotel," died suddenly on last Tuesday evening.

PERCOT celebrates his natal day on the 15th inst. An unusually good programme of sports is being prepared.

HON. J. B. ROBINSON, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, and Mr. Thea. White, M. P., have returned from England.

MILITIA PROMOTION.—Sergeant Edward Ives, of No. 2 Company, Tryon, has been promoted to a second Lieutenantship.

AMONG the presents showered upon Cete-wayo previous to leaving for Zululand were shawls for his wives and a bull-dog.

DR. BAKER EDWARDS, the public analyst in Montreal, has found that one tenth of the lager beer sold there is pure alcohol.

W. W. WOOD, chief engineer of the United States navy, was drowned last week near Point Lookout, Virginia, while in a sail boat.

MR. MORTON, M. P. P. for Kings, has been appointed to succeed his late colleague Mr. Crawford, as Solicitor General of New Brunswick.

A GENTLEMAN farmer of Ontario, sent THE EXAMINER a lengthy and interesting letter on the treatment of the potato bug. It will appear to-morrow.

HON. W. G. STRONG, High Sheriff for Prince County, is at present absent from the Island attending a general conference of the Methodist Church of Canada.

EXTENSIVE forest fires were raging in Annapolis, N. S., on Monday morning in every direction. Large tracts of valuable timber lands were destroyed.

THE RACES at the Moncton Driving Park take place on the 20th and 21st. The directors offer \$775 in prizes, and it is expected that there will be a large number of entries.

THE League of Deliverance from Chinese invasion has been boycotting San Francisco merchants for selling goods made by Chinese labor. The boycotters have been arrested.

THE erection of the monument to the memory of the late Prince Imperial is rapidly approaching completion on the green in front of the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich-common.

A MEETING of the British American Book and Tract Society will be held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on Friday evening at 8 o'clock. A number of gentlemen interested in the work will address the meeting.

HON. JOHN TODD, aged ninety-two years, the oldest Hudson Bay servant, died at Victoria a few days since. He came to America in 1805 with Lord Selkirk, and crossed the Continent to the Pacific in 1814.

DURING the month ended August 31st the total number of immigrants arrived in Ottawa was 237, but already the arrivals for the season number 1,992, or some 600 in excess of the total immigration for the season of 1881.

THE Conservatives have carried the constituency of Bagot, P. Q., where a vacancy was caused by the retirement of Mr. Mosseau. Mr. Dupont, the Government candidate, has been elected by a majority of over three hundred.

THE American authorities are acting wisely in re-shipping immigrants of a dissolute class. There arrived in New York the other day a London woman, who is one of the most notorious drunkards in the metropolis, and whose passage to America was paid by the police. She was sent back again.

THE Sun says: "It is well to remind the public occasionally that all the fertile land of Canada does not lie in the North West. There is as good soil in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, as can be found anywhere in the world." Yes we know, that is so.

A SERIOUS and probably fatal accident occurred at five o'clock last Tuesday evening, at Woodstock, N. B., while a number of young boys were amusing themselves firing at a target with a pistol, a short distance out of town. By some unexplained mishap, a lad named Jordan, was shot in the abdomen. His recovery is extremely doubtful.

THE Daily Telegraph, writing about London, says: "We say it deliberately and advisedly, and without least of contradiction, that there is no European metropolis save our own, in which schoolgirls of twelve and thirteen would be allowed to roam about the streets unaccompanied by older guardians, and to pick up strange acquaintances of the male sex."

HALIFAX was jubilant last evening over a grand display of fireworks, and a concert in the public gardens for the entertainment of visitors. The Regatta is all the talk of the town. It is expected that the double scull race will be a fizzle. A difficulty is experienced in boating the oarsmen, no boats having been brought to the city and none being procurable. There are three entries for this race, but only two pairs will start, viz., Hamm and Conley, and Warren Smith and McKay.

STRANGE PROCEEDING.—Last Friday, Capt. D. McDonald, owner of the schooner "Margaret Jane," then lying at Railroad Wharf, called at the Pioneer office for the purpose of making a statement in reference to official abuse to which he had recently been subjected at Sydney, Cape Breton. Capt. McDonald says that while ashore at that place, some time in July last, he was seized and put in jail on charge of having cut, destroyed and carried away six nets belonging to a man named McIsaac, while his (McIsaac's) schooner was in the vicinity of Port Hood. On being taken by the Sheriff, McDonald was hurried off to jail, without being allowed to look for a person to go in his security, or even to go on board his vessel to put his coat on. McD. represents the treatment he received in jail as rough and cruel. He says the place was filthy beyond description—a perfect dungeon with no more convenience than if intended as a pound for cattle. According to his statement, the jail is used for a three-fold purpose—prison and hospital for both sick and insane, while the treatment received by some of the inmates was cruel and heartless beyond belief. After being in jail two days in this foul place, McD. was released on payment of \$45, in addition to the loss of his time, annoyance and "rough usage."

THE steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax this morning. She sails on return this evening at 6.

MR. MOUSSEAU, Premier of Quebec is unwell, and has been advised to withdraw from the scene of his labors for a few days.

THE Flagship "Northampton" leaves Quebec for Halifax to-day. She will probably call at Charlottetown on her way thither.

STR. JOHN A. MACDONALD has purchased a small estate at River du Loup with the intention of making it his permanent residence.

DR. ALLAN, of Belleville, is suing the Montreal Times, Toronto, for \$2,000 damages for an alleged libel published last year.

L. R. ARCHIBALD, Esq., and Trackmaster McPherson, left yesterday by special train to inspect the Western Section of the Railway. They will return to-day.

THE Customs Collections at the port of Victoria in August were \$89,500, \$48,000 in excess of the corresponding month last year, and \$25,000 higher than ever before.

THOMAS DUFFY, an employee at the Lorne Restaurant, died suddenly last night. An inquest was held in view of the body by Dr. Conroy, to-day. The verdict has not yet been returned.

THE Pioneer complains that "the unearthly shriek of the locomotive" as it passes through Summerside, annoys those who are well, and seriously affects, at least, some of those who are ill.

It has been estimated that the North American continent is being reduced in height at the rate of a foot in every 3,500 years by the erosive action of water. This fact makes us feel for posterity.

ACCORDING to the Pioneer, "Hall's Manufacturing Company" and Messrs. Dickson & Clarke, both of Summerside, are very actively employed in the manufacture of improved agricultural machines.

THE child of Mr. Peter Robertson, Lot 34, so seriously cut by a mowing machine on Tuesday, lies in a very precarious condition. It was frightfully cut on the abdomen, body, arms and knee. Dr. McLeod was called to the boys relief. He dressed the wounds, and did all in his power to relieve the child's pain.

THE Customs receipts for the Dominion for August are \$2,422,789, an increase of \$401,674 over August 1881. The Excise receipts for August are \$520,042, being an increase of \$76,345 over August last year. The total increase in Customs and Excise Revenue for July and August this year over corresponding months last year is \$854,972.

THE Pioneer says that produce hauling will soon be brisk throughout the country, and says that the Com. of P. Works will therefore do well to see that roads and bridges are everywhere in good trim.
