ISLAND LOBSTER FISHERY.—A despatch from Toronto says: Lobsters received by wholesale houses from Prince Edward Island indicate that the lobster pack this year will be light, owing to the poor fishing on the Eggmont Bay fishing grounds. Hundreds of lobster traps have not been raised for weeks past, it being an absolute impossibility to lift them owing to the enormous quantity of kelp (weed ashes) with which the lines are covered. Indeed in many places it is doubtful if the traps and gear can be recovered at all. It is possible that the Government may consent to extend the fishing season, if not lobsters will be dear next year.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS.

The first of a series of meetings to be held by the Baptist body in this city began yesterday at 11 a. m. The meeting was called to order by the pastor, Rev. J. A. Gordon. Rev. A. Freeman was chosen as moderator. A short time was spent in devotional exercises.

After appointing committees and doing some preliminary business, the first session closed with prayer by Deacon Hooper. The afternoon session was devoted to our Sabbath School work, and was quite an interesting meeting. Rev. Mr. Fullerton and C. James, Esq., (Presbyterian) took part in the discussion that followed the bringing in of Sabbath School reports. Many helpful suggestions were given to Sabbath School workers: (1.) The Teacher must be converted. (2.) They must not try to teach too much, but fix the thoughts of their class on a few leading ideas; concentration—that was the idea. Bro. Fullerton gave some fine points. First, teach the classes Christ; then teach them your own peculiar ideas of church government and ordinances. He deprecated the feeling now gaining headway in our churches of making light of church rules and tenets. Bro. James' remarks were also helpful and interesting. The session closed with prayer by Rev. Mr. Fullerton. The evening meeting was unusually interesting. First a teachers' meeting was conducted by Rev. J. A. Gordon. Bro. Gordon's methods are now too well-known to require any praise. The value of black board exercises was seen by the teachers, perhaps as never before, to be an important factor in our Sunday School work.

Rev. R. A. Allaby gave an address, subject, "The teacher," Rev. J. Miles, "The school," and Rev. Mr. Sport, "The relation of the church to the school." All the exercises were listened to attentively and seemed to be heartily enjoyed by the congregation. Prof. Tufts, Rev. McCully Black, editor Messenger and Editor of Norman McNeill, Bro. George McDonald (Baptist Book Room), and Professor Chapman, of St. Martin's Seminary, were invited to seats in the association. The meeting closed with prayer by Bro. Allaby.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Twenty minutes were spent this morning in doctrinal exercises, led by Rev. J. Miles.

The regular business of the Association opened at 10 o'clock with prayer by Bro. McDonald. The first business was reading the brethren of letters from churches by Bro. Spurr.

Some of the brethren took rather a discouraging view of the outlook in our churches. But Brother Gordon stated, in speaking of the report, that the Baptist body was the only body which could report progress on the Island during the last decade.

Rev. Mr. Sutherland, Presbyterian, and Rev. Mr. Harding, Disciple, were invited to a seat in the association spoke to the report. We regret that space will not permit us to give even a synopsis of their speeches. They gave utterance to many words of good cheer and encouragement to the assembled brethren, and all felt like thanking God and taking courage. Brother Mc'Black also spoke to the report and made some casual observations on our climate and garden Province. He was puzzled to know why any one left this beautiful Province.

The committee on arrangements stated that this afternoon would be given to Education. The session closed with prayer by Brother Sutherland.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM THE M'KAY WOOLEN CO.

SIR,—In last evening's EXAMINER you say you are authorized to contradict certain statements contained in a letter of ours, published in THE EXAMINER of the 6th inst.

The points referred to are two: first, that it is denied that Mr. L. E. Prowse holds the position of superintendent in the Rev. Mr. Brewer's church; second, that Mr. Prowse was not publicly rebuked by Mr. Brewer, as stated by our letter. Strictly speaking we admit being in error as regards the superintendency in Mr. Brewer's church—that is, the brick church. But Mr. Prowse was superintendent of the school connected with the Second Methodist church, and we used the term in its general sense. With regard to the rebuke, it will not be denied that Mr. Prowse was rebuked by Mr. Brewer, but he (Prowse) was superintendent of the school connected with the Methodist church as called by the pastor at the special request of Mr. James Paton, before which meeting Mr. Paton proved clearly that Prowse Bros' advertisements were grossly personal and unjust to him, and as a consequence, Mr. Brewer stated that the advertisements "were not creditable and ought to be discontinued." Now, as this meeting was held for the express purpose of bringing Prowse Bros. to book for their attacks on James Paton & Co., with the result stated above, we claim to have substantiated our charge contained in our letter of the 4th inst.—that the senior partner in Prowse Bros. held the position of Superintendent of Sunday Schools, and that he was publicly rebuked before his fellow merchants.

We may add that it has come to our knowledge that at the meeting of the merchants referred to above, Mr. Prowse, on behalf of his firm, and in common with other merchants present, gave his word of honor that all personalities and other features complained of in the advertisements of Prowse Bros. would in future be carefully avoided.

In referring to their advertisements to which we have called attention, we leave it to the public to judge how far Mr. Prowse has kept his word.

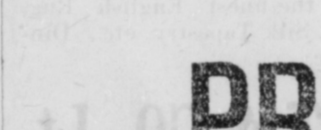
