Heads Ch'town Rotary Club



Dr. J. H. Shaw (above), director of Laboratories, Provincial Health and Welfare Department, was elected president of the Charlottetown Rotary Club at the regular weekly meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Mr. William Cairns, of Lower Preetown who was guest speaker, gave the members a comprehensive and interesting account of his experience and observations while touring the United Kingdom and European countries for six months under the Nuffield Scholarship he had been awarded.

Mr. Cairns, who represented the Maritime Provinces, Quebec and Ontario in the scholarship award, was particularly impressed with the extent to which farming had been mechanized in Britain, and the foreknowledge of prices on all agricultural products, before planting, as supplied by the government.

Farm Improvements

Farm improvements were carefully scrutinized and when approved the cost of such improvements was borne by the Government up to as much as fifty per cent, with three years leeway for the farmer to pay the balance out of income.

Agricultural Tribunals in many towns throughout the country see to it that farmers and land-owners

keep everything on a business and high productive level. Under this arrangement, production has been increased by more than fifty per cent and the only reason accepted for a disturbance of this balance is failure of the farmer to produce.

Mr. Cairns reports many of the leading farmers as being highly educated and equally successful financially.

"The National Farmers Union with offices in every town in England, Scotland and Wales, and headquarters in London keeps agriculture on a high level of efficiency and also accounts for an enviable labour arrangement whereby farm labourers are on a 48 hour week.

"The government is footing the bill for a tremendous reclamation program under which grassland of great value is being developed," Mr. Cairns said.

Modern Methods

"Power and paved roads," have been a prime factor in improving conditions on British farms," the speaker said. "From what I have seen the my conviction is that we in Canada are a long way from top production."

Poultry are fed and watered electrically and are raised in confinement, while overhead storage of feed in cattle barns is never seen, it being considered advisable to let in fresh air and sunlight in these areas. Silos are never built upright, hay is usually baled and the potato yield is about the same as on the island, were other interesting facts brought out by Mr. Cairns. The early plowing and longer season sometimes permits two crops to be grown and harvest. Fertilizer is used much more freely than here and farming generally is more intensive with the "return per acre" dominating, rather than with the return per man."

The meeting was presided over by Reg Bell who introduced the speaker, who was thanked by the co-chairman Hal Shaw.
