THE COILA.—The steamer Coila arrived in Barbados on the 9th inst., 12 days from Charlottetown. She experienced a heavy south-west gale on the 1st inst. Two horses died on the passage. The Coila has been chartered to the French Cable Co. for two months to repair cables on the South American coast.

THERMOMETER READINGS.—In Moncton on Sunday night, the mercury in the thermometer at the railway station stood at 7 below zero, and on Monday morning at 8 o'clock 2 below was recorded. At Fredericton on Monday morning at 4 o'clock 12 below zero was recorded. The coldest so far recorded in Charlottetown this season was 10 above zero, marked during last night.

THE HOLIDAYS.—In consequence of Christmas Day and New Year's Day happening on Sunday, a notice is published in the Royal Gazette, by order of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, that Monday, the 26th inst., and Monday, the 2nd January next, be observed as holidays in the public holidays.

MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.—The Presbytery met in St. James' Hall yesterday. In the event of the Rev. T. F. Fullerton accepting the call to St. James' Church, it was arranged that his induction should take place on the 19th January. Rev. A. McLean Sinclair was appointed to look after the interests of the aged and infirm ministers fund; and Mr. John Gillis was appointed to supply Mount Stewart on the 25th of December. Service to be held at Mount Stewart at 11 o'clock, and West St. Peter's (new church) at 2.30 in the afternoon. The next meeting of Presbytery will be held in St. James' Church on the 19th of January at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

REINSTATE.—A report was in circulation about the city last evening to the effect that Mr. Hackett, Inspector of Fisheries for the Province, suspended some three months ago, had been reinstated. THE EXAMINER'S reporter this forenoon called upon Mr. Lord, agent for the department of Marine here, for the purpose of ascertaining what truth there was in the report, and was informed by that gentleman that a telegram had been received by him the previous evening from the Deputy Minister of Marine stating that the suspension in Mr. Hackett's case had been removed. During the period of Mr. Hackett's suspension Mr. Lord acted as Inspector, performing the duties of the office in a very satisfactory manner. We congratulate Mr. Hackett upon the result of the investigation held in respect to his official conduct.

A SUCCESSFUL SEASON.—The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association was held in McLeod's Hall last evening. The directors' report showed that the past year had been a fairly successful one; that, after meeting all demands, a very respectable balance of receipts over expenditure remains on hand. They recommend that the balance be held over as a rest or guarantee fund to guard against any losses that might occur in future years transactions, which recommendation was adopted. The directors also testified to the good work done during the year by the secretary, Mr. A. B. Warburton. The old board of directors was re-elected, with the exception of Messrs. C. C. Gardiner and Patrick Blake, who declined to allow themselves to be put in nomination, but who both promised to help the board as well as they could. Messrs. J. B. Macdonald and Geo. J. Wright were elected directors in their places.
