**BIBLE TRANSLATED INTO NEW LANGUAGES**—The Bible was translated into 13 new languages and dialects last year. It was announced this week at the annual meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society at London, England, according to information received by Rev. H. D. Raymond, Charlottetown, yesterday. The new languages were distributed as follows: Europe, one; Africa, eleven; Oceania, one. Copies of the Scriptures issued during the year were: Bibles 1,959,966; Testaments 1,247,518; portions 2,379,647; total 11,696,131. The income for the year was \$272,418; expenditure \$282,988 and the deficit \$10,570. In a report recently published by the Society it was pointed out that a Gospel has been issued in a new language every four weeks during the past seven years and a half.

**Meetings Of Red Cross Executive**

Recent meetings of the Executive of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society have been dealing with the matter of the Annual Campaign for membership and contributions and also with a proposal from the New Brunswick Division for a share of the services of Miss MacLean, the Junior Red Cross Director. It was finally arranged that Miss MacLean should give half of her time from the first of May to the 30th of April, 1937, to the New Brunswick Division where she will be engaged as director of Red Cross work in the sister province. Miss MacLean has already on three occasions given of her time in promoting the organization of Junior Red Cross throughout New Brunswick when she met with exceptional success. The good wishes of her friends in this province will follow Miss MacLean in her larger field of endeavour.

The Education and Health authorities of Newfoundland where there has been no branch of the Red Cross Society are very desirous of introducing Junior Red Cross in the schools of the ancient colony. On applying to Miss Jean E. Brown, the Director of Junior Red Cross for Canada, to recommend a suitable person to train the Director of Junior Red Cross whom they are appointing in Newfoundland, they were advised to secure the services of Miss MacLean. The Executive of this Division has agreed to release Miss MacLean for a few weeks next autumn to carry out this work in Newfoundland. The fact that the services of our Director have thus been sought by two of our provinces and commended so highly by our National organization is cause for pride.

The prolonged absence of Miss MacLean from the province necessitates the engagement of an assistant director, and the Executive has appointed Miss Beesie MacLeod, presently teaching at Marmal, to carry on while Miss MacLean is away. Miss MacLeod will enter upon this service on August 1st. Miss MacLeod has had some years' experience in teaching and her ability has been recognized by her fellow-teachers by electing her to the presidency of the Teachers' Federation during the year 1935-36 and appointing her as one of their delegates to the Canadian Teachers' Confederation to be held during the coming summer. The Executive looks forward with confidence to the work of the Junior Red Cross proceeding as successfully in the future as it has in the past.

The moving pictures were preceded by a short program which consisted of a jungle dance by Zion Cup Troop under the direction of Mrs. R. C. Parent. The audience gave the youthful performers generous applause.

gers on the palatial air cruiser could notice only a slight swaying.

Mass was celebrated at a small portable altar by Rev. Father Paul Schulte, Germany's "Flying Priest." Berlin dispatches said only the most meagre reports were published in newspapers there of the Hindenburg's progress. Although Dr. Hugo Eckener, veteran commander and president of the zeppelin is aboard, no dispatches mentioned his name. It had been understood that he was returned to the good grace of the Nazi party after recent differences with the propaganda ministry over what was termed his indifference to Chancellor Hitler's cause in the Reichstag election.

When the Hindenburg comes into sight she will display on her sides the international symbol of the Olympic Games—the interlocking rings, in blue, black, yellow, green and red. She was granted special permission to display the Olympic symbol in recognition of her mission of "peace" and since Germany is host this year to the Olympic Games.
