Supreme Court Hears Action for Damages

A suit for damages of \$2,100 against Gilbert Callaghan, New Perth, by William McGarry, Iona, resulting from a two-vehicle collision at Pole's Corner Nov. 1961, was heard in P.E.I. Supreme Court yesterday before Mr. Justice Mark MacLellan.

The defendant, making a \$75 counter-claim against the plaintiff, is represented by M. Alban Farmer, Q.C. Counsel for the plaintiff is John J. Holmes. McGarry testified that he had been driving a three-ton truck north from Montague on the day of the accident and had slowed down upon approaching the intersection. He said he had almost reached the white line of the main highway when he saw the Callaghan vehicle about three feet in front of him.

Iona 'Phone Service Given 2-Weeks to Decide Action

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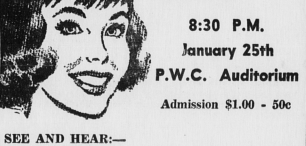
