## CHAMBERLAIN SCOLDS GOVERNOR MURRAY

### Quite a Sensation at St. John's, Nfld.

MURRAY LOOKED UPON AS DISCREDITED AT HOME.

Receiver General Morine Will Return to the Cabinet.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 21.—Hon Joseph Chamberlain notifies Governor Murray that he will not advise interference in the Reid contract. The despatch "roasts" the governor generally for his attitude towards the contract and the government for doing things without the knowledge or consent of his advisers, and for his manner of furnishing information to the Colonial Office.

Governor Murray is looked upon as discredited at the Colonial Office.

The correspondence notifies him that governors must be governed by their constitutional advisers.

Murray sails for England in January. Chamberlain orders publication at once that Receiver General Morine will return to the cabinet shortly.

### Situation in Italy.

ROME, December 20.—During the debate on the budget in the Italian chamber of deputies Admiral Canevaro, minister of foreign affairs, referring to Italy's foreign relations, said there had been no change of policy with regard to alliances, and that the relations of Italy with other nations had never been so friendly as at the present time. "The government is particularly gratified," he declared, "at the conclusion of the Franco-Italian treaty, which makes us confident of the ability of Italy to dispel the last traces of misunderstanding with France and to establish mutual cordiality and friendship."

### A Great Age.

NIOLET, Que., Dec. 19.—There died at the Hotel Dieu here yesterday Dorothy Lefleur. She was 106 years old.

### The French Again!

AUCKLAND, N.Z., Dec. 20.—Steamers which have just arrived here report that the French are actively engaged in fortifying Tahiti, the principal island of the Society group, which is under the control of France.

### Marchand Retires.

CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 20.—Major Marchand and his party evacuated Fashoda during the morning of December 11th, when the French flag was lowered and the British and Egyptian flags were hoisted. The French detachment started for the Sobat river.

## SIR W C McDONALD K.C.M.G.

MONTREAL, Dec. 21.—The new Mining Building of the McGill University erected and equipped by Mr W C McDonald, the millionaire tobacco manufacturer, whose gifts to McGill have aggregated two millions and a half, was formally opened yesterday by Lord Minto, Governor General of Canada.

The feature of the proceedings was the investing by Lord Minto, through the Queen's orders with the order of K. G. M. G on Mr McDonald.

### Many Deaths in Alaska.

VICTORIA, B.C., Dec. 19.—The steamer Danube brings news from Skagway that fifteen or twenty people have lost their lives on the White Pass road since winter set in, chiefly by avalanches. A well-known packer named Ferrow has been found frozen to death on the trail to Bennett. A number of other deaths have occurred on the trail.

### Caesar's Ashes.

ROME, Dec. 19.—Ashes, supposed to be those of Julius Caesar, have been unearthed at the base of a column in the Roman Forum. The column marked the spot where Caesar's body was cremated.

### Baron Napier Deaq.

LONDON, Dec. 20.—News was received here yesterday of the death of Francis Napier, at Florence, Italy, ninth Baron Napier and Ettrick, the former ambassador, who was minister to the United States from Great Britain in 1857. He was born in 1819 and entered the diplomatic service in 1840.

### Klondike Exhibition.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—The government proposes to make a special Klondike Exhibition at Paris exhibition.

### White Pass Railway.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—D C Fraser is here on his way from Skagway. He is enthusiastic over the prospects of the White Pass railway.

## A BIG FIRE IN MONTREAL.

### S. Greenshields, Son & Co., Burnt Out.

LOSS \$300,000. McINTYRE, SON & CO. LOSES \$200,000.

Greenshields Building Destroyed—Firemen's Narrow Escape.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

MONTREAL, Dec. 21.—A fire last night completely gutted the big dry good store house of S. Greenshield, Son & Co, one of the largest drygoods houses in Canada.

Half an hour after the fire started the roof fell in and ten minutes later one of the walls fell into Craig Street and the other street wall into McGill street.

Several firemen had narrow escapes. Loss \$300,000. The fire wall separating the Greenshields building from the dry goods house of McIntyre, Son & Co, collapsed, and the flames gutted the premises of that firm.

The only thing that prevented it from spreading was another lane.

The loss in the McIntyre stock and building will reach \$200,000.

### A Priest's Evidence.

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.—In an assault case in Hull against Dr McKay it was said that the woman who was prosecuting had told her priest in confessional. The priest was called to give evidence. Objection was made on the ground that what took place at confession could not be disclosed. Justice Lavergne, on cross being cited to him that such was not the case, ruled that the priest would have to answer the questions, although in the meantime the priest said he had nothing to tell, as he never remembered the woman speaking to him on the subject at all.

### Hudson Bay Route.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 19.—James Fisher, member of the Manitoba legislature, who accompanied the Dominion government exploration expedition to Hudson's Bay last year, has presented his report on the result of the expedition to the provincial government. Fisher's finding is that the Hudson's Bay route for purposes of commerce is absolutely worthless.
