Tense House Hears Bill Amending Assessment Act

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 3.—Crowded galleries and a tense House heard Premier Hepburn introduce in the Ontario Legislature today the bill to grant separate schools a larger share of corporation taxes. Debate on the measure will open Monday. The bill, amending the Assessment Act, removing the optional clause in existing legislation which said a portion of these taxes "may" be diverted to separate schools and substituted the word "shall."

Fear N.S. May Be "Blacklisted" By Newspapers

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 3.—Fear that Nova Scotia would be "blacklisted" by important newspapers because of its press agents' claim that had obtained nearly \$6,000,000 worth of free advertising for the province was expressed in the Legislature today by Hon. G. S. Harrington, opposition leader. Col. Harrington read a circular issued by L. B. Palmer, general manager of the American Newspaper Association, warning member papers against the methods employed by Nova Scotia's press agents. "There was danger the government might come to be looked upon as 'spongers,'" he continued.

Amy Mollison Cracks-up In Landing

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) COLOMB-BECHAR, Morocco, April 3.—(C. P. Cable)—Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison smashed the undercarriage of her plane in landing here tonight and will be held up in her England-to-Cape town flight until repairs can be effected. She reached here at 3:45 p. m. (11:45 a. m., AST). Mrs. Mollison, attempting to better the flight record between England and South Africa, left Gravesend, Kent, at 5:50 a. m. Her flying time to Morocco showed an average speed of approximately 150 miles an hour for the 1,500 miles between Gravesend and Colomb-Bechar. The flight record, set in 1936 by Flight-Lieut. Thomas Rose, is three days, 17 hours and 38 minutes.
