RCMP Issue Safe Driving Appeal For Thanksgiving

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Over the Labor Day weekend, P.E.I. was the only fatal-free province, the Inspector notes in a press release. "This is a record for which we can be truly thankful. Let us try to maintain this record by employing good, safe walking and driving practices."

The National Safety Council predicts that during Thanksgiving weekend, 50 Canadians will lose their lives in highway accidents for a safe future to us. The Inspector will be on the highways during the weekend, and Inspector McNeil recommends that motorists use seat belts, avoid drink driving, staying on the right side of the white line, checking equipment, and stopping frequently on long trips.

He would remind the public to "slow down and live," to be cautious, considerate of others, and to obey the traffic laws. "We should be particularly watch closely for motorists."

"They should serve in a community organization formed for a community recreation program in some capacity in order that mutual co-operation between the school program and the community program can be established and maintained, and the programs integrated."

Driver Fined On Conviction

Merrill Taylor, Rocky Point, was convicted yesterday of driving while impaired and fined \$125 and costs. He had originally been charged with drunk driving. He appeared in city police court before Magistrate James Haslam.

John Nicholson, defence counsel in the case, told the court in his summation that the smell of alcohol on the breath of an accused should not be sufficient evidence for a conviction on such a serious charge as drunken driving.

Mr. Nicholson said drinking in general is accepted today by the public and places are provided for the consumption of alcoholic beverages. But, he concluded, it is the unhappy plight of an accused when because of alcohol on the breath of liquor on his breath, there is usually a conviction.

Four drinks, he incalculably made up the remainder of the docket. One was fined \$20 and costs and three were given 20 days in jail each.

The funeral will be held at St. Peter's Church Monday morning.

Wood I. Ferry Has Increase

Traffic figures on the Wood Islands-Caribou run released by Northumberland Ferries Ltd., show a marked increase over those of last year.

Last month's totals list 21,750 passengers, 7,247 automobiles and 1,221 trucks, as compared with September, 1961, when 20,000 passengers, 6,670 automobiles and 1,164 trucks travelled the route.

Between May and September of this year, 14,563 more passengers and 4,948 more vehicles used the ferries than in a comparable period last year. This year's figures are: Passengers—146,005, automobiles—6,348 and trucks—7,469.

Sentence Suspended For 2 Years

GEORGETOWN — A two-year suspended sentence was handed out to Ronald Joseph MacDonald of Cardigan when he appeared before Judge J. S. DesBoches in Kings County Court here yesterday. He was charged with unlawfully having in his possession an offensive weapon, a .22 calibre rifle, for a purpose dangerous to the public peace.

Evidence revealed that MacDonald was threatening people with the weapon.

He was also ordered to enter into recognizance in the amount of \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each.

The accused had earlier elected to be tried by a Judge and jury but entered a plea of guilty yesterday. He was represented by Gerald R. Poster, Q.C. Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGinnis, represented the Crown.

4 To Attend SA Congress

Captain R.H. Walker last night announced that four delegates will be attending the annual meeting of the Salvation Army Congress being held in Toronto.

41 Licenses Suspended In August

"Thirty-five motorists involved in accidents had their driving licenses suspended during August for failure to comply with the province's financial responsibility laws, figures released yesterday by the Motor Vehicle Branch show.

Six others had their licenses suspended under another section of the Highway Traffic Act for reckless driving and leaving the scene of accidents.

Accidents during the month totaled 122, six of them involving fatalities in which six people were killed. This compared to August of 1961 when 98 accidents occurred in which there was one fatality.

Estimated property damage amounted to \$45,157 compared to \$58,918 in 1961.

County Judge Named For N.B.

OTTAWA (CP)—Appointment of William Creaghan, a defeated Conservative candidate in the June election, as county judge was announced Friday by Justice Minister Fleming.

Mr. Creaghan, 40, who is Conservative MP for Westmorland from 1958 until this year, has been appointed judge for the New Brunswick counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche.

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
