London Redeemed.

TORONTO, Feb. 27.
There was lots of enthusiasm last evening when the results of the two elections held yesterday were known.
London, the only city in Canada held by the Grits, yesterday repudiated the gang of organized hypocrites and elected Hon. Mr. Carling, the Liberal Conservative candidate, by a majority of 107, wiping out the "Grit" who was elected by 183 of a majority last March.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.
During the sitting of the Commons yesterday the opposition members found that their dejected and disorganized condition was the chief topic of discussion in the galleries.
It is admitted that the more hungry element in the party are advising the selection of a new leader, and that this repetition of their tactics of 1878, a worrying Mr. Laurier, who like Mr. Mackenzie is sensitive on such a point.

Fatal Collision.

LONDON, Feb. 27.
The steamships Loughbrow and Forest Queen, East Riding, on the North Sea. The vessels crashed together with great force. The Forest Queen was torn apart by the bow of the Loughbrow. The sea rushed through the breaches made in the Forest Queen's hull in great volumes, and the vessel very soon plunged to the bottom. Her crew had no chance to save their lives, and all hands, with the exception of the captain, went down with the ship and were drowned.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.
Mr. Ives officially announced yesterday that the notice of dismissal served on the intercolonial employees was premature as the minister has not yet decided as to the general manager's recommendations in the matter of reducing the staff.

DALHOUSIE, Feb. 24.—Arseneau's prospects of defeating Mercier in B. are daily improving. Mercier's friends are getting doubtful of the result and large pecuniary offers, it is said, have been made to Arseneau, who is not wealthy. It is understood that as high as \$20,000 have been offered to Arseneau to retire on nomination day. "The resources of civilization" are pouring in from Quebec and Montreal and loads are daily hauled throughout the constituency.

AN INTERESTING STATEMENT.—According to an Ottawa dispatch the census, hitherto just issued, in reference to its stable dwellings of Canada, shows a total of 930,000, of which eleven thousand are in course of construction, and 54,000 uninhabited. Of the inhabited dwellings, Nova Scotia has 78,413, an increase as compared with the last census, of 4,677; New Brunswick has 54,187, an increase of 3,231; Prince Edward Island 11,339, an increase of 675.
By looking at the quotations of the Virginia tobacco market it will be found that the highest price paid for "filers"—which is the tobacco which forms the body of the plug—very closely corresponds with the invoiced price of tobacco leaf imported into Ontario. As over four-fifths of all leaf imported into the Province is for "virginia Navy" stock, this fact is official proof of the claim that the "virginia Navy" is made of the finest Virginia leaf.
DEATHS TO DEATH.—A terrible story comes from the village of Lorette, eight miles from Tottenham, Ont. One day about a week ago a peddler whose name is not yet ascertained arrived in the village and put up at a hotel. During the night his room was broken into by a gang of drunken rowdies who in spite of his appeals for mercy beat him to death and when his life was extinct the fiends dragged the body down stairs to the barroom where there was a large stove. Placing the body therein they allowed it to burn to ashes. The Toronto police authorities have been asked to send a detective to trace the perpetrators of the awful act.
BIG GUN COMPETITION.—The Halifax Herald says: There is some prospect of the Garrison artillery competition taking place at Halifax in the near future instead of at Isle of Orleans. The majority of the brigades of garrison artillery are in the maritime provinces, and there is only one brigade west of Montreal, which would make Halifax a most convenient place. Besides the members of the brigades elsewhere would profit by a visit to Halifax where they could see the various implements of modern warfare in use by the Imperial authorities. When Colonel Montzembert, deputy inspector of Dominion artillery, was in Halifax last year it is said he inspected a property on the eastern shore of Bedford basin, which he deemed a most suitable place for the big gun competition, the targets being placed up in the basin.
