Home Disarray Frazles Man

DEAR C. G.: Innocently, in a witless way, you are taking a wrong turn in marriage, it seems. And I gather that Jim is demoralized by a sense of being hopelessly involved in a chaotic tangle of domestic relations that he cannot bring to order.

It is significant that his raging impatience with your performance (and the children's needs) began "shortly after the baby came"—I assume you refer to the third and latest child, now 14 months old. And significant also that "the children's welfare is your first concern"—as you say.

Jim's coldly critical air is that of a deeply offended spouse. And his angry jibe, that you care for him only as a source of support, suggests that he feels exploited, carelessly treated and taken for granted in double harness—not treasured as a best friend, companion and sweetheart.

Feels Cheated In Partnership

In berating you for alleged neglect of the children's health, caustically calling them "dumb" like you, fussing about his misplaced mail, etc., Jim is charging you in effect, with failure in the field of womanhood. Specifically he means you've failed him—but he hasn't figured it out so clearly. He

feels cheated and disappointed—as you struggle with child care around the clock. Likely the growing size of the family is putting financial pressure on Jim, keeping the house in disarray and reducing your time and inclination for lovemaking—factors that may frazzle his nerves and account for his harsh disposition and foul language recently. Perhaps you haven't realized the importance, to marriage, of shaping the household routine to the wage-earner's comfort as nearly as possible—showing respect for his wishes, and ingeniously promoting some adult privacy. If you feel overwhelmed by the care of three children and baffled by Jim's bitterness, my advice is to apply to your local Family Service Organization for firsthand guidance in getting knowledgeable control of the situation.
