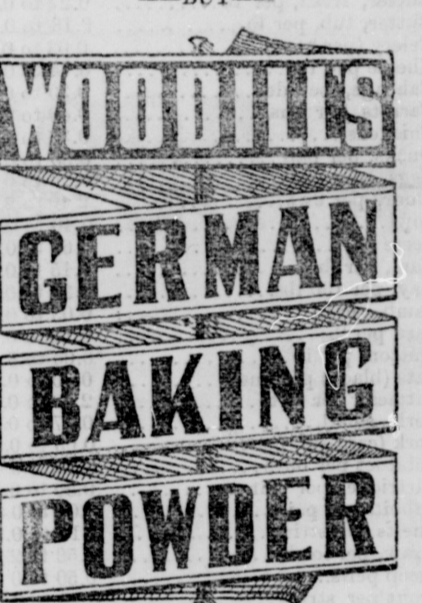

## Six New Atlantic Steamers.

There are now six fast steamers building  
which will press the City of Paris of the  
Inman Line very hard in keeping her position  
as champion racer of the ocean. The  
Hamburg-American line, whose twin pro-  
peller, the Columbia, made a new record  
of 6 days 18 hours 10 minutes to South-  
ampton on November 14th, will have a  
magnificent new twin-screw ship running  
in May next. She is to be called the Nor-  
man, and is now building at the yard of  
Messrs. John Elder & Co., the constructors  
of the Etruria and Umbria. The Norman  
is a little smaller than the City of Paris,  
being 520 feet long, with 59 feet beam and  
38 feet depth of hold. She will have 16,  
000 indicated horse-power. She will be  
launched in March next. The keel of her  
sister ship is being laid by the Vulcan ship-  
building company, Stettin. This vessel  
will not be ready to run until the spring  
of 1892. She will be called the Venetia.  
The French line also has a big twin screw  
ship on the stocks, which will probably be  
running next summer. She is called the  
Touraine, and is to be several thousand  
tons larger than any of the fine single screw  
ships of the French line, which hold the  
record between New York and Havre. The  
White Star steamer Majestic, a sister ship  
to the Teutonic, will be ready to do battle  
with the City of Paris next spring. The  
Cunard line will also put two twin screw  
boats in the field to win back the lost  
laurels of the Etruria. Their names have  
not been selected. They will be powerful  
ships, and will take the place of the Servia  
and the Aurania, which will do duty be-  
tween Liverpool and Boston.

## Boston Markets.

POTATOES.—Receipts past six days, 69,

is still running light. Best Houlton and

sold up. Choice Burbanks have been in  
steady demand and close firm at 63 to  
65c. Best Cheanogoes firm at 75c.  
EGGS.—Receipts for the past week 3  
boxes, 210 bbls., 6,883 cases last week 155  
bbls., 9,419 cases. Prices unchanged.  
FISH.—No material change in prices to  
report. Mackerel in moderate demand.  
Market overs'ocked with smelts.

## A Sad Fatality at Pollett River, Quebec.

A house owned by Mr. Calvin Marnie,  
section man, at Pollett River platform,  
about six miles this side of Petitcodiac, was  
destroyed by fire yesterday forenoon, and  
two infant children perished in the flames.  
Mr. Marnie had gone to work, and Mrs.  
Marnie left the house about nine o'clock.  
She left her two infant children in the  
kitchen, one of them aged about two years,  
sitting near the stove, and the younger  
child, aged about nine months, in the  
craze. Mrs. Marnie was absent about an  
hour and when she returned found the  
house in flames, and saw that it would be  
impossible to save her children. By this  
time some of the neighbors had run to the  
spot. Mrs. Marnie was nearly frantic at  
the sight of her children roasting to death  
and would have rushed into the burning  
building after them had not the neighbors,  
who knew that it would be certain death to  
do so, forcibly prevented her from carrying  
out her purpose. The house and all its  
contents were burned to the ground. The  
origin of the fire is not definitely known,  
but it may have resulted from the older  
child playing with the fire. It is un-  
derstood there is no insurance and the loss of  
children and house will prove a severe blow  
to Mr. Marnie.—Transcript.

## Personal.

Colonel Stoppel, formerly French military  
attache at Berlin, who warned his govern-  
ment before 1870 that the efficiency of the  
German army would make war disastrous to  
France, has published a sensational pamphlet  
advocating a French-German offensive and  
defensive alliance to check Russia. This al-  
liance, however, he says, is only possible if  
Alsace-Lorraine is restored to France.  
Emperor William has given \$20,000 to erect  
a church in Berlin in memory of the Empress  
Augusta.  
Sir John Macdonald says the government  
has not abandoned the intention of securing a  
fast Atlantic mail service.  
Mr. Gladstone and members of the last  
Liberal Cabinet who are in sympathy with  
the Home Rule movement, will discuss party  
policy at Mr. Gladstone's house, February 8th.

eral, died late Friday night of heart dis-  
ease. He was 62 years old and entered the  
service 35 years ago.  
It is reported that the Government have  
decided to yield to the demand of the print-  
ing bureau composers for an increase of  
wages from \$11 to \$13 per week.

Wm. O'Brien delivered an oration at  
Dublin last week, in which he made a  
strong defence of Mr. Parnell. He spoke  
warmly in favor of putting continued confi-  
dence in the Irish leader. An agent of a  
London publishing firm went to O'Brien  
the other day with an offer of £1,000 for  
the serial rights of the novel he has just  
written. "Not at all," said O'Brien.  
"I'm not going to take money for my  
novel merely that Lord Salisbury may grab  
it for the costs in my libel suit against  
him." This probably has no equal in the  
whole literature of transactions between  
authors and publishers.

## News Notes.

Senator McDonald, of Toronto, is re-  
ported somewhat better.  
A Broadway florist trimmed a dress worn  
at McAllister's ball in New York with flow-  
ers costing \$113.

Mrs. Haller, of Port Townsend, Wash.,  
dreamed that her husband stood before her  
without coat or vest and drenched with  
water from head to foot. The next she  
heard of him he was found drowned.

An electric street car line at Pittsburg  
has no slot-rail, overhead wires, central  
station nor power-house. The vehicle is  
propelled by a dynamo driven by a gas  
engine supplies from tanks of compressed  
gas.

It is stated that an order in council  
has been received from Ottawa by the  
Lieut. Governor disclaiming any re-  
sponsibility for damages caused by the re-  
cent rock slide in Champlain Street, on the  
ground that the accident was the result of  
natural causes.

A London despatch says it is rumored  
that Sir James Hannen will retire from the  
bench on the presentation of the report of  
the Parnell commission, and that he will  
be succeeded in the presidency of the Pro-  
bate, Divorce and Admiralty Division of  
the Supreme Court by Sir Henry Charles Lopes,  
Lord Justice.

Advices from Astrabad, Russia, report  
that Persian Khorassan is ravaged by an  
intestinal disease of excessive fatality.  
Three thousand deaths are reported. At  
Nowin Meshed there were 100 deaths daily.  
Owing to the scarcity of doctors the nature  
of the disease is unknown. As Western  
Persia was ravaged with cholera throughout  
the autumn, and as thousands of people fled  
eastward in the hope to escape the disease  
it is regarded as possible they carried it  
with them, and that this may account for  
the trouble in Khorassan.
