EMPLOYMENT BUREAU

An employment bureau has just been opened to the Women's Council, and the information office will be conducted by Miss Snellgrove, Kent Street. Following are the regulations and scale of charges:

- 1. Fees be paid to Miss Snellgrove.
2. Reference must be given by persons wanting employment.

Terms for persons wanting employment:

- 1. Initial fee for registering name, 5 cents.
2. Such name to be retained on books for the period of three months in cases of temporary employment, such as sewing girls, errand boys, laundresses, &c., without further pay.
3. In cases of employment for more extended periods, such as domestic servants, &c., besides the fee of 5 cents, an additional payment of 5 per cent of first month's wages to be paid at the end of the month.
4. Every time one of the class, such as domestic servants, obtains a situation through the Bureau, the fee is to be renewed.

Terms for employers:

- 1. Initial fee, 10 cents, in cases of obtaining persons for work by the day, such as sewing girls, &c., the name of employer is to be retained on books without further pay for a period of three months.
2. In cases of obtaining servants for more lengthened terms, such as domestic servants, 15 cents additional to be paid when help is secured.
3. For every servant of the more permanent class, the fee, both initial and additional amounting to 25 cents to be received.

For persons with a recommendation from one of the women of the Council can have name registered for work by the day free. It is recommended that the member of Council who takes an interest in above persons pay the initial fee.

Employment registry: All persons wanting employment, and employers of labor in want of assistance, will obtain help and situations by applying to Miss Snellgrove, Kent Street.

ARTHUR KAVANAGH

SIR,—Will you be so kind as to publish an account of a Mr. Arthur Kavanagh, a member of the British House of Commons, which I have clipped from the Montreal Daily Star. I am personally acquainted with him, as I often saw him go to my uncle, Mr. Matthew Murphy's place, M. Lofus, County Kilkenny. His residence is about three miles from Mt. Loftus, and often saw him with my uncle's sons. I saw him at a hunt, and he leaped over a ditch about six feet high. He sat in a saddle made like a chair and coming up under his arms. My brother John often took him from his saddle. I was at the time only 14 years of age, and lived with my uncle. I thought by publishing this extract it might reach others on the Island who may know something about this wonderful man. I am yours very respectfully,

To the Editor of Notes and Queries:

SIR,—Arthur McMorrough Kavanagh, Lieutenant and Custos Roterorum, of Carlow, J. P. for counties Kilkenny and Wexford, was M. P. for Wexford, 1866 to 1868, for Carlow, 1868 to 1880; was High Sheriff of Kilkenny, 1855; of Carlow, 1857; chairman of the New Ross Board of Guardians, only son of the late Thos. Kavanagh, and Lady Harriet Le Poer French, daughter of the 2nd Earl of Clanricarty, born 1831; married 1855 Frances Mary, daughter of Rev. Joseph Forde Leahy. The above named gentleman was in many respects one of the most remarkable men of his time. Born without legs from the knees down, and without arms from the elbows down, he was otherwise a man of fine physique, robust constitution, and more than ordinary talent and culture. In the House of Commons he was looked on as the ablest of the Irish Conservative members, and one of the most fluent speakers on the same side. He was also an enthusiastic sportsman, always a familiar figure on the hunting field, riding well to hounds. He had an ingenious mechanical contrivance made of wickerwood on both sides of his saddle, which some way held him to the horse. The Kavanaghs are one of the oldest Irish families, and during all the political changes in Ireland, they always managed to hold possession of their vast estates. The subject of this sketch prided himself on being the direct descendant of Mac Morough, King of Leinster, whose daughter, Eva, married Strong B. W., the first of the English invaders, and always signed his name, Arthur Kavanagh R. (the R. being for Rex). Thomas, his grandfather conformed to the Protestant religion in the penal days to protect his estates. He does not appear to have become a very zealous Protestant, as tradition says he took to drink during the balance of his life; he died in Talbot street, Dublin, after being again received in the Catholic Church. A good joke is told of his change of religion. An Irish Catholic gentleman upbraided him for doing so, saying to him, Kavanagh, you were the first Catholic in Ireland. Now you have made yourself the last Protestant. His family were brought over Protestant, and have remained so ever since. The mother of the subject of this sketch was, like all the French family, a most zealous Protestant, tenantry and tried by every means to bring the tenants and peasantry to her way of thinking. Her actions brought her into bitter hostilities with the celebrated Dr. Doyle, who was then the Roman Catholic Bishop of the district. He denounced her as a persecutor of his flock, and published a declaration that "a terrible judgment would befall on the Kavanaghs." In the family mansion at Borris there was a Catholic chapel for which when the family

became Protestant, there was no more use. Lady Kavanagh was superintending the dismantling of this chapel, fastened to one of the walls of which was a large cross with a life-sized ivory statue of the Saviour. A working man, in trying to loosen it from the wall, put an iron crowbar behind it, when suddenly with a crash the figure of the Saviour fell at Lady Kavanagh's feet, the legs and arms breaking off at the knees and elbows. The lady became terrified and left the chapel. Some months afterwards when her son was born he had neither arms nor legs. The people looked upon Dr. Doyle as a prophet, and Arthur Kavanagh was known all his life as Dr. Doyle's child. He lived down any prejudice which was against him; was a most excellent landlord, a large employer of labour on his estate; spent his money in the country, and was in every respect a model country gentleman, highly popular with all classes of the people.

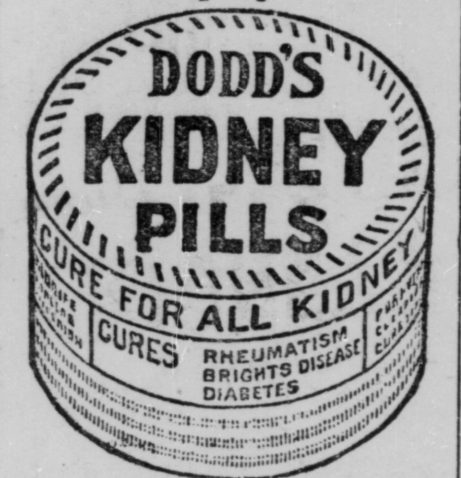
