ARMY STATISTICS.—The English army consists nominally of 211,474 officers and men, but it is said that only one army corps can actually be put in the field, and that only by frantic make-shifts. THE ISLAND STEAMERS.—The St. Lawrence did not return to Charlottetown from Point du Chene on Saturday night, but remains on the western route until to-morrow evening, when she will come here. The Princess of Wales leaves to-night for Summerside and Point du Chene, and will ply between those places for the balance of the week. By this arrangement both steamers go to Point du Chene to-morrow.

RECRUITS.—Recruits are being called for to fill the vacancies in "B" Battery, Quebec, caused by some forty men having volunteered for service in the new Battery, organized in British Columbia. The terms of enlistment seem liberal, and we think some of our young men would find it advantageous to take this opportunity of joining our permanent force. None but sober reliable men of good physique will be accepted. A handbill showing the terms of enlistment may be seen in the hall of the post office or at the office of the District Paymaster, &c., Victoria Barracks. A FITTING TRIBUTE.—The flag on the American Consul's office in this city, was dropped to half-mast to-day, and the national arms draped with crape as a tribute of respect to the memory of Hon. Elihu B. Washburn, who died at his home in Chicago, on the 22nd inst., aged 71 years. These emblems of mourning will be continued for ten days. The Hon. Mr. Washburn rendered good service to the United States in many capacities. He was for some time Secretary of State; he also sat in the National Legislature as a representative from Illinois, and subsequently acted as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to France. In the language of Secretary Bayard, "his private life was unstained, his public acts unquestionably great, and his memory will long be cherished with affection and respect by his grateful countrymen."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

Mr. Chamberlain Interviewed. LONDON, Oct. 30.

Mr. Chamberlain was interviewed on the Eturia at Queenstown to-day. On his arrival at New York he intends to go direct to Washington and not to Ottawa, but he laughed heartily on hearing the rumor that the Irish Attorney-General would accompany him. He attached no importance to the strictures Canadian and American papers thought fit to pass upon him. He said, "I do not intend to return to England directly my labors are finished. Not having been in America before, I am awfully anxious to see the country and institutions. I also intend to visit Canada. It is unlikely I shall return until shortly before the assembling of Parliament. I am inclined to think that if a great and generous scheme of local government was granted to Ireland, the feeling in favor of a separate parliament would gradually die away. I think much of it is a mere sentiment. I firmly believe it is not beyond the reach of statesmanship to make Ireland peaceable and contented with a full measure of local government."

Suffocated. MONTREAL, Oct. 30.

Last night two waiting girls employed at Mrs. Queen's, Beaver Hall Square, finding the room too warm turned the damper at the pipe and retired, permitting the gas to escape into the room. This morning one of the girls, Ida Hawkins, was found dead, and the other, Annie Flynn, unconscious. The latter has been restored to partial consciousness, and may possibly recover.

More Honors. LONDON, Oct. 30.

It is officially announced that the Earl of Lytton will be appointed to succeed Lord Lyons as British Ambassador at Paris.

The Queen will bestow an earldom on Lord Lyons on his retirement from diplomatic life.

Sworn In. QUEBEC, Oct. 30.

Lieut.-Governor Angers took the oath of office yesterday afternoon. The ceremony occurred in the Legislative Council Chamber, and was one of the most brilliant ever witnessed here, the attendance being large and influential. After the ceremony a levee lasting an hour was held.

The Newfoundland Bait Bill. LONDON, Oct. 30.

Lord Salisbury has notified Mr. Waddington, French Ambassador here, that royal sanction will be given to the enforcement of the Newfoundland bait bill next season.

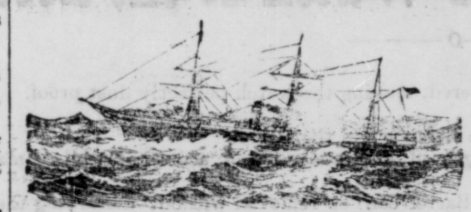
