The governments cash balance reflects all of its transactions, including normal operating and tax revenue, and informed sources say the \$230,000,000 drop should be taken as meaning that much was spent on buying U.S. dollars to fatten the exchange reserves.

But they say it indicates some large purchases of U.S. dollars, just as the sharp increases in government cash earlier this year signalled the heavy decline in foreign exchange reserves.

# GOT LOAN RE-PAYMENT

On top of this, the exchange fund got some \$60,000,000 U.S. dollars from the mid-July payment in advance by France of \$67,000,000 on a post-war loan by Canada.

Meanwhile the exchange rate on the Canadian dollar has held fairly steady in recent days at about 92 cents in U.S. funds—one-quarter cent above the 92 1/2-cent level fixed May 2. This margin above the parity rate—it was one-eighth of a cent three weeks ago—provides a "cushion" for government purchases of U.S. dollars for the exchange fund.

At the start of the month there was \$1,808,700,000 in the exchange fund, but this included a \$300,000,000 loan from the International Monetary Fund and \$550,000,000 obtained in a reciprocal exchange "swap" with United States and British central banks.
