### DEATH OF MR. A. N. LARGE

We announce, today, with much regret, the death of Mr. A. N. Large, for nearly twenty years chief of the Fire Department of Charlottetown. Mr. Large was well known as one of our smartest citizens. Upwards of thirty years ago he joined the city Fire Department. He assisted at the fire by which the old Victoria Hotel was burned in 1860, and was in the midst of almost every fire that has occurred in Charlottetown since that time. His activity was always remarkable.

He was elected lieutenant of the Rollo Steam Fire Engine Company under Captain (Dr.) Strickland; and when, in 1876, the Sibley engine was imported and Captain Strickland was transferred to her, Mr. Large became captain of the Rollo. In February, 1881, Mr. Large was elected by his fellow firemen to the office of Chief Engineer; and the election was subsequently confirmed by the City Council.

Mr. Large was a Past Grand Master of St. John's Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons. Besides being an active and prominent citizen, he was a kind and loving husband and father. We heartily sympathize with his bereaved widow and children in this hour of their great loss and sorrow.

The British Trade returns for the seven months ending with July 1 show increase in imports from Canada of cattle, wheat, bacon, lams, cheese, eggs and fish, but decrease in imports of Canadian wheat, flour, maize, butter, hewn wood and sawn wood. The Montreal Star remarks that the "Laurier Government will make credit for all the increase, but will not like to be blamed for the decrease. Mr. Fisher boasted much when the Canadian butter exports to Britain increased, but he will not wish to be held responsible for the decrease of £81,000 or nearly \$400,000, in the value of Canadian butter consumed in Great Britain during the last seven months as reported by the British Board of Trade."

The Montreal Gazette remarks that "the Toronto Globe is stirring up the Ontario Orangemen to vote against Conservative candidates because, it says in connection with the Remedial Bill of 1896 Sir Chas. Tupper 'humiliated and crucified' them." L'Etoile, of Three Rivers, is stirring up Quebec Catholics to vote against Conservative Candidates because Canada is presided over by a French-Canadian Catholic, and Conservative success would replace him "by an Englishman, an Orangeman." The old double-faced gang is at its old double-faced work.

It has been well said the gentlemen in office are in no need of a leader, as they have Mr. Tarte. We shall hear more about the time for election when he comes home.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The population of Chicago is now set down at 2,007,695.

So it appears that THE EXAMINER is already making it rather too hot for The Patriot.

We regret to learn that the Charlottetown Board of Trade is not likely to be represented at the meeting of the Maritime Board to be held this week.

An arrangement is reported under which the indemnity due the United States from Turkey will be added to the price of a warship, should one be ordered to be built in America.

A popular revulsion against the sensational newspaper is setting in in England as well as in America. After all, it is the honest and reliable newspaper which holds the people's respect and confidence.

The North Sydney Herald expresses the opinion "that an appeal to the electorate will take place before November 30th." In any case those who are opposed to the Tarte-Laurier-Sifton-Blair administration ought to be ready for the fray.

On June 30, 1900 there were 72 warships under construction in the United Kingdom, 54 being for the British Government. Sixteen of the vessels are being built in Royal Dockyards and the remaining 56 in private yards.

It is reported that when at the taking of Tien Tsin, the charge set to blow up the gate did not explode, a Japanese officer held a light to it and blew up both the gate and himself. If the report be true there are reckless heroes in the east as in the west.

The election campaign in the United States has been simplified by the withdrawal of Mr. Towne from the Populist candidacy for the Vice Presidency. Bryan and Stevenson are now the candidates of both the Populists and the Democrats.

Montreal Gazette: "There seems to be a question whether or not Sir Louis Davies and Messrs. Blair and Fielding are with Mr. Tarte on his way home. Only Mr. Tarte's name is mentioned in the despatches. When the Master is on deck the rest of the administration does not count."

There are now twenty-eight lines of railway in the United States and Canada that have more than 2,000 miles of track, and the total length of these twenty-eight lines is 147,061 miles. The New York Central System has 14,416 miles of track, the Pennsylvania 10,392 and the Canadian Pacific 10,018. These are said to be the three longest railways in the world.

The foreign trade of the United States in the last fiscal year, ending with June 30, reached the enormous figure of \$2,243,901,041, to which the exports contributed \$1,394,186,371, and the imports \$849,714,670. The total is \$320,000,000 ahead of that of any twelve months in the record. There was a "balance of trade" in favor of the country of \$545,000,000.

The funeral of the assassinated King Humbert took place on Friday last, and was the occasion of a great loyal demonstration on the part of the people of Italy. Republicanism is not likely to be greatly promoted by the murder of Kings. The anarchists engaged in the campaign against the crowned head of Europe are fools as well as knaves.

It is significant—but it is not wholly displeasing—that the Guardian and Patriot are both grossly misrepresenting THE EXAMINER so early in the campaign. Fact is, there is no possible defence for many of the Government's sins of commission and omission. We expect to be misrepresented constantly during the next two months.

It has been remarked that the number of deaths by drowning this summer has reached an unusual figure. The daily record runs from one, two or three, to half a dozen, and includes young men and women as well as boys. The cases are not one to be mended by advice, the facts themselves carrying their own lesson. It can hardly fail, however, to create a wish for the exercise of the care that would prevent most of the regretted incidents.
