The manuscript by author William Manchester — subject of a suit by Mrs. John F. Kennedy and current negotiations with publishers to remove passages offensive to her—is reported to tell of friction between the Kennedy group and Johnson.

The book relates events surrounding the Nov. 22, 1963 assassination of President Kennedy in Dallas.

One section is reported to tell of Mrs. Kennedy's shock at finding Johnson and his party already in command aboard the presidential plane, Air Force One, by the time Kennedy's body was borne aboard in a coffin.

Another section of Manchester's book is reported to relate Mrs. Kennedy's annoyance that Johnson repeatedly called her "honey," and what Johnson was told when he telephoned the slain President's brother, Robert F. Kennedy, then the attorney-general, for a ruling on whether he should take the oath of office immediately in Texas aboard the plane.

Newsweek says in a story in the Jan. 2 issue that Johnson recalls that the secret service wanted to put him aboard Air Force One with its superior communications gear and to place Kennedy's coffin on the vice-presidential plane, Air Force Two, which had flown Johnson to Texas.

"But Johnson ordered the

body put aboard Air Force One," Newsweek says, and quotes Johnson as explaining to intimates:

"I wasn't going to let Mrs. Kennedy fly back alone with his body."

By Johnson's memory, Newsweek says, Robert Kennedy was not noncommittal about when he should take the oath of office as stated in the Manchester manuscript.

The magazine says Johnson's version is that Kennedy recommended that he take the oath on the spot. "He recalls telephoning Bobby: 'I hate to bother you at a time like this, but...'" and asking for a ruling," Newsweek reports, adding: "Kennedy, he said, told him: 'I think you should be sworn in there'" but Bobby also said he would check it and call back. The return call came instead from the deputy attorney-general Nicholas Katzenbach, who advised Mr. Johnson to take the presidential oath at once and dictated it, according to a Johnson secretary.

Heavy Drinker In U.S. Likely Male And Young

WASHINGTON (AP) — The heavy drinker in the United States is likely to be male, young and upper middle class—a kind of social doer—but he is outnumbered by abstainers almost three to one.

Those are some of the findings of a new study on U.S. drinking habits, reported Monday, that labels 12 per cent of the population as heavy drinkers—but not necessarily problems to themselves or others.

And although they are mostly male, there are strong indications that more and more women are joining the group.

Dr. Ira H. Cisin of George Washington University told of a continuing surveillance on 2,746 Americans and their drinking to provide a better backdrop for the study of alcoholism.

The poll showed also: —Abstainers, those who either don't drink, or who drink only once a year, totalled 32 per cent of the population. —Inrequent to moderate drinkers from the bulk of the population—57 per cent. Cisin said he believes they are more often the producers of society. —The heavy drinker is more likely to entertain at home than outside, more likely to choose his close friends from work than from his neighborhood or his family less likely to attend church, and more likely to come from a family that at least condoned drinking.

To qualify as heavy drinker in terms of the study, a person must acknowledge drinking at least several times a week, three or more drinks to the sitting, or he must drink nearly every day-taking as many as five drinks once in a while.

AMC Confirms Merger Effort

DETROIT (AP)—The board chairman of American Motors Corp. has confirmed that the auto maker "some months back" approached Litton Industries Inc. to explore the possibility of merger.

Robert B. Evans, AMC chairman, said nothing developed from the contact and AMC had not held discussions with Litton since then.

AMC and Litton officials in Los Angeles last week denied that they planned to merge.

Evans said in an interview that AMC also approached some other firms at the time about the possibility of merger. He declined to elaborate.

Pearson Says Outside Capital To Continue Canadian Need

TORONTO (CP) — The Star quotes Prime Minister Pearson as saying Canada could never have reached its present economic position without the help of outside capital.

Mr. Pearson was interviewed recently by Peter C. Newman, the Star's Ottawa editor. Today the paper carries the transcript of a two-part transcription covering a wide range of affairs.

On the federal government's attempt to "Canadianize our economy," Mr. Pearson said: "I'm anxious to ensure the maximum amount of Canadian ownership and control of our resources, of our industry and of our economic development."

But it was "unrealistic" to think a country could have sole, single, exclusive control over its economic destiny.

need outside capital "but I hope less and less as we become stronger and richer and richer."

He said the government sees no reason for changing its strong stand that Canada should maintain control over its banking and insurance companies.

"While we should welcome foreign capital, we should also insist that Canadian subsidiaries of foreign corporations... be have in every respect as Canadians."

The first step toward bringing about realistic unity with French-speaking Canadians would be "to understand better their hopes and aspirations, their insistence on maintaining their separate culture, their separate language and their separate traditions."

CONTRACT BRIDGE

This turned out to be a costly decision when South now proceeded to make the contract even though the indications were that he would have a spade and two club.

With East showing trumps on the opening lead, South realized that his only chance for the hand was to try to execute a trump end play against West. Accordingly, he won the club with the seven, cashed the ace of diamonds, and played a spade to the king.

East won with the ace and returned the nine of hearts, taken in dummy with the queen. Declarer now ruffed a diamond, cashed the queen of spades, and then ruffed his last spade with the eight.

After trumping another diamond in his hand, South cashed the king of hearts and then overtook the jack with the ace.

By this time ten tricks had been played and South had only the A-10-9 of clubs left. West, who had done nothing but follow suit all the way, had the K-Q-4 of clubs as his last three cards.

So when declarer now led the jack of clubs from dummy and played the nine from his hand, West found that his two apparently invincible trump tricks had somehow changed into one. As a result, South made the contract; the only tricks he lost were a spade and a club.

The declarer is sometimes able to accomplish what appears to be impossible. Many contracts that seem hopeless at the start can be saved by assuming a specific division of the adverse cards which allows the contract to be made, and then playing in accordance with that assumption.

South got to five clubs doubled and West led a trump. West undoubtedly would have defeated the contract had he made the more normal lead of a spade, but he decided to lead a trump in the hope that this would reduce dummy's ruffing power.
