JACOBY ON Canasta

For Beginners - 5

The first meld for your side in any hand must total a certain number of points. After that first meld, however, you may meld a great deal for very little -- just as you please.

The amount needed for your side's first meld varies as the game progresses. At the beginning of the game, you need 50 points. That amount is reduced to 15 points (the smallest possible three-card meld) if your total score is less than zero. This happens when you lose more than you win on the very first hand. Later on in the game you usually have enough of a plus score to take a loss of this sort without going into the red.

In Canasta your score is added in full at the end of each hand, so that you always know your exact score up to date. When that complete score reaches 1500, the amount you need for your side's first meld goes up from 50 points to 90 points. It stays at the 90-point mark until your score reaches 3,000 points -- and then you need 120 points for that first meld.

Those amounts -- 50 points, 90 points, and 120 points -- influence your play. You practically never have much trouble putting together a meld that counts up to 50 points. However, 90 points is often quite a chore; and 120 points is sometimes impossible.

Fortunately, it isn't necessary to scrape together all your points with one group of cards. For example, you might meld 50 points with three kings and four sevens; or you might meld 90 points with three aces and three nines. You almost invariably need wild cards to reach the count of 120 points.

Save these simple installments. If you're a beginner, you'll soon be able to profit from the tips given in the second part of each article. If you're an experienced player, save the first half to teach the game to others.

For Experienced Players - 5

When you need 90 points for your first meld, you cannot assume that your partner is bound to have the count. It may take several rounds to develop the count, and in the meantime he will be unable to pick up the discard pile.

For this reason it is important for you to make the first meld if you can conveniently do so. Naturally, the question is: When is it convenient?

If you can take a discard pile of almost any size at all, do so and meld your 90 points. It doesn't pay to bother with a pile of only one or two cards, however, unless your meld uses up very few cards.

If you must make the meld from your hand, without benefit of the discard pile, don't use more than six cards for the meld. It's bad enough to be left with only five cards in your hand; don't make it any worse.

For example, suppose that after drawing a card you hold: A-A-A Q-Q-Q 10-8-7-5-4-2 You wouldn't meld on the first round, but would wait about two rounds in the hope of developing
