Royal Couple Make New Friends In Tour Of Eastern Ontario

By JOHN LEBLANC TORONTO, Oct. 12 (CP) — A Prince and Princess swept through Eastern Ontario today and swept Ontarians before them. In a fast-paced trip from Ottawa on this, the fifth day of a month's tour of Canada, Princess Elizabeth and her smiling consort, Prince Philip, were blessed throughout by clear, blue skies and a brilliant sun. They captured, in turn, Cornwall, Brockville, Kingston, Belleville, Trenton and finally, at the close of the day, Ontario's capital, Toronto. More than 1,000,000 persons cheered them on their way. They sped for much of the 200-odd-mile distance from the Can-

Reds Regain Section Of Famous Ridge

(By John Randolph) U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Oct. 13—(Saturday)—(AP)—Three Allied divisions jumped off today in an attack on the central front and violent fighting exploded across most of the Korean battlefield. As the Allies surged forward in the centre, the Communists struck back in the east. An Eighth Army communique announced that a Communist platoon had recaptured a dominating peak on Heartbreak Ridge, scene of more than a month of bloody conflict. An Eighth Army briefing officer said only that the entire strategic hill mass could not be considered "secured" and that savage fighting raged all night on a lower slope of the ridge. On the western front, possibly 1,000 Chinese Reds in a three-pronged attack overran—with heavy American casualties—a weakened battalion of the U. S. 7th Cavalry Regiment northwest of Yonchon. Yonchon is 35 miles north of Seoul. The attack in the centre was along a front at least 14 miles wide, the briefing officer said. This was described as an "illimited objective" attack in an area generally south of the enemy city of Kumang. In this same general area, South Korean troops northwest of Hwachon struck Chinese positions and drove the Reds off five hills almost as fast as they could run. The situation on Heartbreak Ridge in the east was not clear. Before the briefing, the communique had reported an Allied setback.

Cardinal McGuigan On Visit To Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 12—(AP)—James Cardinal McGuigan, Toronto Catholic Archbishop of Toronto, officiated at Mass in the Basilica of Guadalupe today as the first official act of his visit here. The Cardinal arrived last night by air for a visit to Bishop Miguel Dario Miranda of Tulancingo.

KILLED IN ACCIDENT

EDMUNDSTON, N. B., Oct. 12—(CP)—Mrs. Alfred Plourde, 42, was killed today when a car passed under the platform of a truck as the larger vehicle was backing to a street. The impact tore away the top of the car, driven by Guy Plourde, 19, son of the victim. He escaped injury. An inquest will be held tomorrow.

Ming Sung Ships Fear Seizure By Canadians

HONG KONG, Oct. 13—(Saturday)—(CP)—Crews of seven Chinese ships flying the Canadian flag were reported today to be detaining the vessel in Communist China, apparently of fear of seizure because of a \$12,000 debt to Canada. The ships were built in Canada after the Second World War for the Ming Sung Company, a Chinese trading firm, with loans backed by the Chinese Nationalist Government and the Canadian Government. When Nationalist China fell, they were transferred to Canadian registry and have been trading under the Canadian flag, although not manned by Canadians or Britons. The Ming Sung Company has been operating them out of Hong Kong on trading runs to Communist-held Canton. The company's Hong Kong office said Canada rejected the company's plan for repaying money owed on the ships and consequently the crews were detaining the ships in Communist waters out of reach of Canadian or any other non-Communist law—pending "Canada's reconsideration of her attitude."

26 Million Monthly In Family Allowances Now

OTTAWA, Oct. 12—(CP)—The Federal Treasury now pays more than \$26,000,000 a month in family allowances. A report tabled today in the Commons by Health Minister Martin showed allowance payments now amount to approximately \$30,000,000 a year compared with about \$173,000,000 in 1946, the first full year in which the allowances were paid. The report, covering the fiscal year ending March 31, 1952, disclosed that 1,910,192 families with 4,367,391 eligible children were receiving allowances. The allowances are paid at the monthly rate of \$5 for each child under six years; \$6 for each child from six to nine years; \$7 for each child from 10 to 12 years; and \$8 each child from 13 to 15 years.

Egypt To Put Heat On British In Suez Area

CAIRO, Oct. 12—(AP)—Egypt will soon put the heat on British troops in the Suez Canal area by declaring them "enemy forces" and cancelling their special privileges, official sources said today. A program of non-co-operation to cut off the troops' drinking water, fresh food and the use of Egyptian labor was forecast to follow parliament's abrogation, expected Monday, of two old treaties. These treaties authorize Britain to keep 10,000 troops, 400 pilots and various auxiliaries on guard at the strategic canal and provide for joint British-Egyptian rule of Sudan, bordering Egypt on the south. Britain has announced she intends to maintain her full rights under the treaties, however. (A battalion of the South Lancashire Regiment, stationed at Trieste for three years, was ordered to be ready to embark for Sudan by Oct. 26—speeding up a long-scheduled transfer by a month. The native Sudan defence force is commanded by British officers. (Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison conferred in London with British service chiefs. One source said they may have discussed counter-measures to any Egyptian policy of non-co-operation. (Oil-rich Iraq now is seeking revision of the 25-year treaty of alliance she signed with Britain in 1930. The British Foreign Office announced Friday the first move for revision was made by Premier Nuri Al Said on a visit to London last month. It did not go into detail. Britain maintains two air bases in Iraq and stationed British warships in Iraq waters at the height of the oil crisis in neighboring Iran.)

Lawyers, Bankers Guests At Meeting Of Maritime Chartered Accountants

Mr. R. W. Manning, of H. R. Doane and Company, made note of the fact that it was the first recorded instance of a joint session of the members of the Institute of Chartered Accountants and the Law Society, and he extended a hearty welcome to the guests. Mr. Manning told of the close co-operation evident here between members of the two professions and said that each was only too glad to refer problems it encountered to members of the other profession better able to handle them. Following the business meeting the guest speaker was thanked by Mr. N. Martin of the Institute, while the vote of thanks was accorded by Mr. W. E. Bentley, K.C., representing the members present from the Bar Society.

OTTAWA, Oct. 12—(CP)—Trade Minister Howe announced today that payments totalling more than \$100,000,000 will be made to Prairie farmers short of surpluses of sales of wheat, oats and barley. MONTREAL, Oct. 12—(CP)—The Quebec Dairy Commission yesterday refused a request by Quebec distributors to allow them to sell a cheaper grade of milk. The cheaper grade would contain less butterfat than the present grade but would have added vitamins. WASHINGTON, Oct. 12—(AP)—The biggest, peacetime United States military appropriation in history—\$66,697,808,000—received final congressional approval today. LONDON, Oct. 12—(CP)—The King may soon be ready to start his convalescence after his serious lung operation, it was learned tonight. He may leave his room in Buckingham Palace for his Windsor estate, 22 miles away, any time after this week-end.

May Use Force

(Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison) of Britain declared his country will use force if necessary to keep her troops on the canal. A Labor Party rally at Staines, England, cheered his declaration: "We are there, we have a right to be there and we shall stand absolutely firm in exercising our undoubted rights until some new agreed arrangement comes along to be substituted for it." (Meanwhile, it was reported both in Cairo and Washington that Egypt will be invited Saturday to take her place in Middle-East defence. It was reported that Egypt will be invited to become an equal member with Britain, the United States, France and Turkey. British service sources said that, even if Egypt did cut off supplies and communications, their Suez base could get along for a considerable time because "it has its own stores, communications and power systems." Supplies could be flown in, one source explained, if Egypt blocked supply ships from the base.

To Include All Fields

Convinced that it stands on safe constitutional ground, the government has decided, the informant said, to risk the possibility of court action and make its new combines legislation comprehensive—no field of retail sales will be overlooked. Sees Opportunity For Island Hog Producers

The Island hog producer is in an advantageous position to avoid lower monetary gains or his products during seasonal recessions than producers elsewhere, said Mr. H. W. Clay, Senior Livestock Fieldman, Dominion Department of Agriculture yesterday, in commenting upon the surplus of meat products which occurs each fall. This annual surplus is a normal occurrence, he said, due to the heavy slaughtering of lambs and poultry, and in these cases little can be done to avoid it. Looks For Home Building Upsurge Within 2 Years

TORONTO, Oct. 12—(CP)—Resumption of large-scale housing construction may be expected by 1953 or 1954, D. B. Mansur, president of Canada's Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, said today. Addressing the annual meeting of the American Life Convention, Mr. Mansur said that life insurance funds can be looked to for an important part of the necessary financing. He added: "Most of the industrial capital facilities and military installations required may have been created in both the United States and Canada by 1953 or 1954. Our countries would then be reasonably equipped to turn out the quantities of armaments and munitions considered necessary to assure national security. "By that time Canada may have sufficient resources available to return to a level of close to 100,000 new houses a year." Ronald A. McEachern, editor of the Financial Post, Toronto, referred to the investment opportunity in Canada. He said Canada at present is

On Price Cutting

OTTAWA, Oct. 12—(CP)—The four-man MacQuarrie Committee on Combines has labelled the common practice of retail price-fixing "restrictive and monopolistic" and has recommended that the government eliminate it. But the legal and economic brain trust also struck a blow at another retail practice—that of selling quality goods at below cost to attract customers to other goods—and suggested that legislative action be taken against this, too. The "loss-leader" device, said the committee in a 29-page, 12,000-word preliminary report tabled in the Commons today, also was "monopolistic" and against public welfare. Because of inflation, the committee did not consider that it presented "any immediate danger," even if the government took action to eliminate the more extensive resale price maintenance practice. "Extreme forms of price-cutting are not very likely in this period of inflation and relative scarcity," the committee said. Yet in Hamilton, Ont., a price war seemed in full swing, resulting from the government's disclosure in the Speech from the Throne last Tuesday that it planned legislative action on the MacQuarrie report. One store cut prices on quality goods; another followed and a third, serving a "price war notice" in a newspaper advertisement, said it would "match or better any cut price in town." Informants said the parliamentary weapon being prepared will strike at both interprovincial and provincial trade.

30,000 Loss In Co-op Store Fire

BATHURST, N. B., Oct. 12—(CP)—Loss was estimated at \$30,000 today after an early morning fire gutted the Bathurst Co-operative Store and destroyed its stock of groceries. Mr. and Mrs. Hebert Dempsey and Mrs. Eileen Morrison, occupants of an upstairs apartment, lost possessions valued at \$1,600. All the contents of another apartment, whose occupant was away, were lost.

25 New Nfld. Industries Announced By Smallwood

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 12—(CP)—Premier Smallwood said tonight that 25 new industries, headed by a steel mill to use ore from the Wabana mines at Bell Island, will soon be established in Newfoundland. Speaking on the CBC Newfoundland network, the Premier said his new projects, negotiated during his recent trip to Europe, will provide 15,000 jobs within the next two years along with the eight industries already established since his Liberal Government came into power. Stating the government would continue its drive for more new industries, Mr. Smallwood said: "We're going to develop Newfoundland or perish in the attempt." Factories to manufacture furniture, textiles, shoes, machine tools, chemicals, gloves, lead piping and optical equipment were included on the list along with engineering and aluminum plants. Other metallurgical industries would follow the establishment of the steel plant, the Premier said. The projects, to be operated by English and continental European firms, would be aided by the government with dollar loans.
