New Records By Bank Of Commerce

New records in all major areas of the bank's business are reflected in the general statement published today by The Canadian Bank of Commerce, which contains the balance sheet and undivided profit statement for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1954.

Total assets climbed to an all time high, at \$2,058,716,970, being up \$147,000,000 from last year's record figure. Total deposits increased by \$140,000,000 to also reach a new peak of \$1,938,666,112.

Notable among the increase in deposits was a marked gain in personal savings deposits and a substantial increase in other deposits.

Total loans are shown at \$880,696,776, the highest point in the bank's history. This represents an increase of over \$60,000,000 from a year ago, a major part of which is reflected in commercial and other current loans. Call and short loans in Canada and elsewhere

were up approximately \$26,000,000 to reach \$77,778,738. Investment holdings of Government of Canada securities increased by \$105,000,000, to \$608,132,429.

The statement again reveals a strong liquid position, cash assets of \$318,359,500, representing 16.10% of the bank's public liabilities. Total quick assets increased by \$116,000,000 during the year and amounted to \$1,190,057,659, equivalent to 60.19% of total liabilities to the public.

Net profits increased \$615,108 to \$6,404,350 after provision of \$6,807,000 for Government of Canada taxes and depreciation of \$1,685,029. A further transfer of \$3,000,000 from undivided profits was made to

retained account, which also was increased by the transfer of \$10,000,000 from the bank's tax paid reserves. After giving effect to the above transfers the bank's paid up capital and retained accounts now stand at \$81,000,000 and the balance of undivided profits at \$647,648.

LAKE VERDE - SOUTHPORT TRAIN SERVICE RESUMED
