Loss of Life at Sea.

MACHIAS, Me., Dec. 3.—The schooner Florence P. Hewson, Captain Wesley Peterson, arrived in the harbor at 6 o'clock this evening in a disabled condition. The Hewson was from New York bound to Halifax, with a cargo of 19,000 bushels of corn, and when off Cape Sable, Sunday morning, was struck by the gale. Everything movable was swept from the deck, the steering gear was disabled, all lower sails, boats, davits, were carried away, the cargo shifted and two men lost overboard—Charles Reed, of Hopewell, Cape, N. B., and George McLellan, of Monton.

LISBON, Dec. 3.—Thirty-seven people who were on board the British steamer Drummond, from the Clyde via Liverpool, for Cape Good Hope, previously reported totally wrecked in the Bay of Biscay, were drowned. The numbers of the ship's company were 23.

Of Special Interest to our Farmers

Creaming Milk From Cows Calved More Than Six Months.

(Prof. Robertson's Report)

The milk from cows which have been milking more than six months does not yield its cream so readily as the milk from cows more recently calved.

During the cold weather of autumn and winter, by the setting of milk (in deep-setting pails, in cold water, at a temperature of 38° to 40° Fahr., for twenty-two hours) from cows which had been milking for periods of from six to twelve months, about 33 per cent of the total quantity of butter-fat in the milk was left in the skim-milk.

When the milk of cows, which had been milking for periods of less than six months each, was set as stated above, from 7 to 15 per cent of the total quantity of butter-fat in the milk was left in the skim-milk.

Where the milk of one fresh-calved cow was added to the milk of eight cows which had been milking for periods exceeding six and a half months each, and the milk was set as stated above, about 14 per cent of the total quantity of butter-fat in the milk was left in the skim-milk.

During the autumn and winter when the milk from cows which had been milking for periods of more than six months each was set in shallow pans for twenty-two hours, from 5 to 15 per cent of the total quantity of butter-fat in the milk was left in the skim-milk.

By the use of the centrifugal cream separator all the butter-fat in the milk except about 3 per cent of the total quantity, may be recovered into the cream from the milk of cows at all stages of lactation and during all seasons of the year.

DRESSED HOGS.

The Way They Manage the Weights etc., in Ontario.

From the Market Report of the Farmer's Advocate of Nov. 11th:

It pays to deal fairly with the farmers Mr W Harris, jr. who started purchasing dressed hogs last year, bids fair to monopolize this trade: his secret has been fair dealing. Every farmer who sells his hogs at the Jarvis st store in the St Lawrence market, knows to a cent what he should receive and gets it. In fact many deliver their hogs without asking the market price, and there is no dispute as to weights. They are weighed separately and 1 lb per 100 lbs deducted for the head, and the city market scales may be taken if desired with the 1 lb per head deducted. The experience of many farmers and their complaints to me on the score of deduction, weights, etc., calls for this recommendation. It is the custom of the trade to deduct 1 lb from every 100 lbs, and the packers also expect the draft of the scales. This leads to many disputes. Mr William Harris, jr. desires it to be publicly known that he has always accepted the city weight-masters weights.

THE EAST PRINCE ELECTION

Sir,—In the Patriot of the 3rd inst. there appeared an editorial in which a comparison was made between Mr. Lefurgey and Mr. Bell. In his personal allusions the article is as unfair as it is foreign to the issues in the contest. What does it concern the electors of East Prince if Mr Lefurgey deemed it expedient to take a legal course in the Harvard University in order to equit himself for carrying on the commercial pursuits in which he is engaged? Does the Editor of the Patriot think for a moment that such a course renders a young man unfit to represent a constituency in the Canadian House of Commons? Surely the Editor of the Patriot will admit that Mr. Lefurgey in going to Harvard to acquire a knowledge of commercial law and other kindred subjects only took a step, wholly essential in qualifying a public man to discharge his duties with the intelligence and success which he has demonstrated upon him as a representative. Examine the conduct of Mr. Bell in our Local Legislature and observe if it justifies to any degree the praise so bountifully lavished by the Patriot's youthful editor. During all the years Mr. Bell has occupied a seat there, today he cannot point to one solitary act, which he was instrumental in passing, which advanced the interests of his constituency or which benefited in any way the province in general. In the most extravagant periods of the Peter's Administration Mr. Bell was ever loud in denouncing his leader and his policy, but on all occasions he voted for that policy and supported those measures that are today burdening the farmers of East Prince and that have saddled a load of indebtedness on our Island home which will take young men like Mr. Lefurgey's years to wipe out. Happily in this age the acts of a public man are regarded more than his long and empty declamations and judging Mr. Bell by that standard his public career in this Province has been an absolute failure. Mr. Lefurgey, on the contrary, has shown in his brief parliamentary career that as a young man he is capable of grappling intelligently with the interests that immediately concern the farmer and every other class in the community. In his short political history he has never been found speaking against any measure and voting afterwards for its adoption. But the Patriot's editor says he is a young man and lacking the experience of Mr Bell's mature years. But Mr Lefurgey belongs to that class of young men who, in the words of Chatham, hopes that his abilities will cease with his youth, and not of that number who are ignorant in spite of experience. But the electors of East Prince in this contest it is not the men whom we are to judge. It is the principles and the policy of which they are the champions and the advocates. We can readily understand why the Patriot drew the comparison referred to, "apart from principle," as it says, for the Liberal party of Canada,

in the presence of the open violation of every pledge made to the Canadian electorate, stands as an aggregation of individuals in whom not a single atom of sound principle can be discovered. By importing into Canadian politics religious and racial strife, and by employing the most deceptive methods conceivable, the Liberal Government at Ottawa gained power. In the past that party opposed every legislation which the light of subsequent years has shown to be inseparably associated with the welfare and prosperity of our country. In opposition commercial union Unrestricted Reciprocity and other bad was their cry. In power these fads are rejected and they follow the National Policy, which for eighteen years they denounced throughout the length and breadth of this Dominion. With the progressive history of this Dominion on the Legislature enactments of this Conservative party are identified. What party has succeeded in making Canada a nation despite all the opposition it encountered during the years of 1878-96. Upon the principles the traditions and the past history of the Liberal-Conservative party Mr. Lefurgey appeals to the electors of East Prince. Mr. Bell, on the other hand, can only appeal to you on the confidence misplaced on the pledges broken and the promises unfulfilled which have characterized liberal rule since 1896. Electors of East Prince, seize the opportunity. Show that you do not endorse the tactics and policy of the Liberal party of this Dominion by electing Mr. Lefurgey on the 14th inst., with a handsome majority. A VOTER.
