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Elected First Vice President



R. P. Hartley, Q. C., (above) Atlantic Regional Superintendent of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, who has frequently visited Charlottetown, was elected by acclamation to the post of first vice president of the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security, which held its annual convention at Milwaukee, Wis., last week. The election of officers came at the concluding session, and news of Mr. Hartley's success was received at his office in Moncton on Monday morning. Election to this post is considered tantamount to nomination of election next year to the Presidency of the 20,000 member organization, which is a non-union group for government employees in the employment and unemployment insurance branches. There are chapters in all regions in Canada, all states of the United States, Japan and France. Mr. Hartley has been President of the Atlantic Chapter since its formation ten years ago. He has also held international office most of those years, and has advanced through the posts of Canadian Committeeman, Committee-at-large and Second Vice-President to his present office.

Several prominent American business executives and a number of Canadian Government top officials addressed various sessions of the four-day convention. Mr. Hartley as Regional Supt. of the Unemployment Insurance Commission in the Maritimes has always taken a keen interest in the operation and welfare of the Island offices, Summerside and Charlottetown. Article On Fungicides By Mr. L. C. Callbeck

An article entitled "Fungicides Protect Potatoes" by Mr. Lorne C. Callbeck, assistant plant pathologist at the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology, Charlottetown, has recently appeared in the Agricultural Institute Review. Mr. Callbeck points out that in spite of the many fungicides available, the long popular Bordeaux Mixture is still the most commonly used, and seems to be meet the needs of controlling the various stages of blight in the tuber plant. In the writer's opinion dusting is not so effective as spraying, chiefly because the dust is more easily removed by rains. In spraying for vine killing, growers should note that when the plants are green and vigorous, the strength of the spray mixture should be considerably increased over that used on partially ripened vines.
