

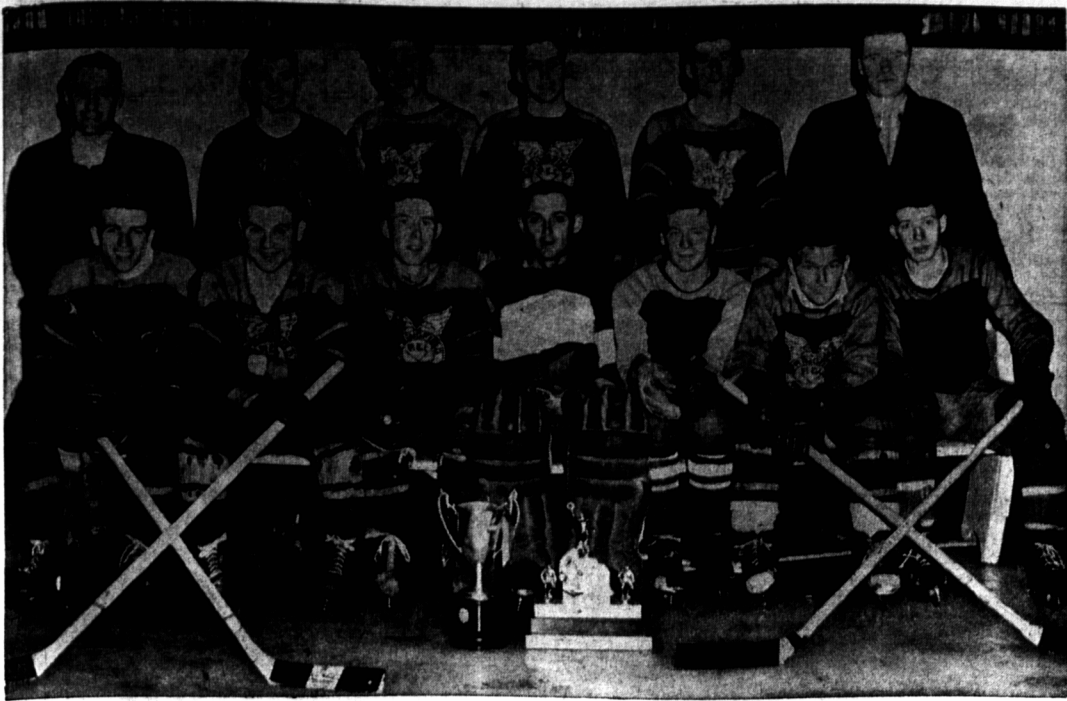
**Remember When**

**Retired Saint John Business Man Dies**  
SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Long prominent in Eastern Canada's lumber industry and a leader in many business fields until ill health forced his retirement, William E. Golding, 78, died at his home here Friday night.  
Mr. Golding entered the lumber industry as a young man and was vice-president of the McKean Lumber Co. Ltd., from its incorporation until his retirement two years ago.  
He was former vice-president of the New Brunswick Telephone Co., Ltd.; president of the River Valley Lumber Company and the Bonny River Lumber Co. Ltd., managing director of the New Brunswick Railway Co., and a director of the former New Brunswick Power Co.  
During the Second World War he gave his services to the department of munitions and supply and assisted the timber controller, looking after the department's interests in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.  
He is survived by a son, Philip E. Golding, a sister and two brothers.

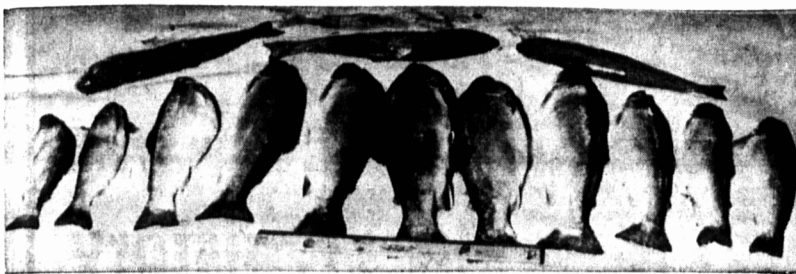

**Mexican Gains Split Decision Over Cuban In Fierce Battle**

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP)—Gaspar Ortega of Mexico finished strong Friday night to gain a split decision over Cuba's Isaac (Kid) Logart in a fierce 12-round battle between the leading welterweight contenders. Ortega, a 2-to-1 underdog, weighed 147, Logart 146.  
The tall, rangy 21-year-old Mexican had the small crowd of about 2,000 rooting for him from the second round on after he had been hit low and dropped to one knee in pain. Logart's low left came seconds after Ortega had staggered his shorter rival with three rights to the jaw.  
Referee Al Berl scored for Ortega, 7-4-1. Judge Harold Barnes also voted for Ortega 6-5-1. Judge Joe Agnello cast his ballot for Logart, 7-5. The Associated Press had Ortega in front 6-4 with two even.

**Durelle Signs For Detroit Bout**

DETROIT (AP)—Promoter Nick Londe Friday announced a June 14 bout at Olympic Stadium between Canadian light heavyweight champion Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., and Tony Anthony of Detroit, next month.  
Anthony, who recently scored a upset victory over Chuck Spieser, is the top-rated U.S. light heavyweight challenger. He had hoped to fight light heavyweight champion Archie Moore in Detroit, next month.  
Durelle's last fight was a 10-round decision over Anglo DeFendis of New York at Madison Square Garden.  
Moore was supposed to defend his title in Detroit June 7 but he is touring Germany and is overweight and refused to go along with a June date.  
The National Boxing Association has given Moore until July 7 to defend his title or forfeit the title.

**Possibility Looms Yachts Will Race For America's Cup In '58**

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yacht Club officially knows nothing about a challenge to race for The America's Cup in 1958, but if the plans of a group of British sportsmen go through the ancient trophy undoubtedly will be dusted off and put into commission over courses of about 200 miles.  
The cup, valued at about \$300, was won in 1851 by the 170-ton schooner America which beat 17 British yachts in a 60-mile race around the Isle of Wight.  
Sixteen British and Canadian challenged, from 1870 to 1937, failed to take the trophy.  
The last races for The America's Cup took place in 1937, when Harold (Mike) Vanderbilt guided just for this one series of races, to victory over T. O. M. Sopwith's Endeavor II.
