The opening of the new Moncton Speedway was held on Tuesday afternoon. There was an unusually large crowd of visitors to the Hub City who were later on to witness the arrival of the King and Queen. The bleachers and all available space was taken up showing that the sport is out for a good start there. It is more than ten years since harness races have been held in Moncton, which was years ago one of the best race cities in the Maritimes. Three events in the gentlemen's driving class gave excellent competition. The 2.20 trot was won by Protector, a son of Protector (3) 1.59 1-4, that looks like a sweet trotter. His summary was 1-3-3-1. Elsie Louise was second with 2-1-2-2. Lucky was third with 6-4-1-3. Uctia L. fourth with 3-2-4-2. Time 2:20, 2:21, 2:20, 2:23. The Free for All was won by Signal Senator 2.08 1-2, summary, 2-1-1, Martindell 2.09 was 1-2-2, Billy Bonder 2.09 was 3-3-3 and Sunshine Express 2.12 1-2 was 4-4-4. Time 2:19, 2:20, 2:20. The 2.25 pace was won by Margaret L. in straight heats, Annaset second with 3-2-2, Calumet June third with 2-4-5, Paul Abbey fourth with 4-3-3. Time 2:25, 2:24, 2:26.

Denny, three-year-old son of Protector (3) 1.59 1-4 and 7111 Brooke 1.59, was a winner over the half-mile track at Columbus, Ohio, five evenings ago in 2.09 1-4. He is entered in the Hamilton stake, richest trotting event of the year. Ben White's declaration against racing two-year-olds is published in all the harness horse journals but with practically no comment. It would not be pleasing news to the great breeding farms who produce foals to sell as yearlings. Looking over Ben's list of candidates for two-year-old honors we don't see anything very outstanding, while other trainers such as Tommy Berry have some real tops. Berry may have had the ability of training juveniles brought home to him more severely in this year than ever before as he started with a large string of them, all supposedly the choicest breeding, but many must have fallen by the wayside.

Maine opens its racing season at Gorham on Saturday, July 1st, getting under way on the same date as most Maritime tracks. At Alberton will be in action for the Province with a thousand dollar program that has been carefully thought out and should bring together a bunch of horses that will provide wonderful competition. Alberton track is one of the fastest in this Province and is always in the pink of condition. There should be a big track here on our Canadian birthday.

Harry A. Nevers died at Caribou, Maine, a few days ago. He was a native of Woodstock, N. B. and will be remembered for the many good horses which he trained and bred between 1907 and 1929. Almost every paper on horse racing with summaries of harness racing in Maine would show Harry Nevers driving a winner or contender. Here are a few of those raced by him in his 25 years on the track. What's this about "Mule" Haas working out with Bureleigh Grimes and his Montreal Royals? ... according to word here Bureleigh is on the point of signing the former Athletics outfield star. ... you can bracket Tony Lazzeri, new pilot of Toronto Maple Leafs, Dan Howley of the Leafs' front office, and Tom Daly, coach of Boston Red Sox together as the only players known to have hit two homers in one game, each with three bases aboard. ...

Cef Garcia, who flattened Walter Woods last night, will get his shot at Fred Apostolis' middleweight crown here Sept. 7. Joe Louis camp isn't particularly worried about Tony Galento's rough stuff in the ring June 28. ... the general feeling is Tony will be too woozy after a minute or two, to pull any, rough stuff. ...

Asked for his plans after the night of June 28 Galento said: "I'll probably defend my title in September and then retire if I can't get any decent 'bums' to fight. ... my switch of trainer to Summitt, N. J., cost him \$2,000. ... The baseball season isn't half over yet but football notes already are reaching sports desks from the Mimeograph machines of college publicists. ... if Glenn Cunningham doesn't place first in that "mile of the century" at Princeton tomorrow, he has expressed hope that Sydney Wooderson is the winner. ... the wise money is on Britain's Sidney. ...

Clarence Hanson, Stockton, California, harness horse trainer, has something new for competition this season in his trotting cow "Bossy" which hooked a speed cart has been making some wonderful performances - for cows! Mr. Hanson challenges any other cow in the world to a half mile race for bankroll or other tangibles.

Nobody has uncocked any fast miles at the Charlottetown Driving Park track yet but as there is only a couple of weeks until July 1st when the horses will meet in battle, Thursday, July 20th, there if they step them up a bit next week. The track is in ample pie order having received plenty of water and frequent brushing so those who occupy the grand stand workout days should clock some fast halves and quarters and perhaps some good miles. As far as we know the 2.19 of Jane Azzoff is the best mile to date.

There will be no racing between July 1st and July 12th we understand, Harry O'Brien having reserved July 5th for his big race, should a postponement due to rain be necessary. July 12th will be Kensington day and Myron McArthur will have a big-up program, including a Free for All which is designed to bring together Jane Azzoff 1.59 3-4 and Simcoe Harvester 2.04 1-1 and other fast ones. Thursday, July 20th, there will be a program of horse racing in connection with Confederation. The committee in charge will announce classes later on, that should fit in most of the horses racing. July 26th has been reserved by Jimmie Milligan for racing at Milligan & Morrison's track, Northam, and August and will likely be utilized by Montague.

Alfie Webster, horseman, fox rancher and all round farmer of Marier, who has bred a lot of good ones, is offering for sale in this issue three head that should be picked up quickly. Leta Kalmuck 2.14 is eligible to the 2.21 pace and is a mare that has shown considerably better than her record and should be a mark of 2.10 or better. She won her race at Alberton last year and made good at other tracks. Balbo 2.16, eligible to the 2.25 class, is a third member of the race and should be a good horse for farm or as a driver, has an excellent disposition and terrific speed and has been caught miles in 2.13 in a race. The third member of Mr. Webster's stable is Lusty Girl, three-year-old trotter that is paid up in Prince Edward Island futurity. She is the only foal here by Lusty Prince 2.07 1-2, and is out of the noted race mare Quinia 2.04 1-4. Mr. Webster finds that his large farm and very extensive for ranching should do much of his time that he cannot give attention to race horses.

English Runner Hopes To Break Mile Record Today

PRINCETON, N. J., June 16 (AP)—Prospect for good for the fastest mile ever run on two legs when Sydney Wooderson, England's wonder sprinter, meets four top United States mileers including Glenn Cunningham, in the feature attraction of tomorrow's sixth annual Princeton invitation track meet.

Wooderson, holder of the world's outdoor record of 4:06.4 for the classic distance, has had four satisfactory workouts on the famous Palmer Stadium track. He's feeling great and has his heart set on establishing a record that might stand for his life-time. The figure in his mind and in that of his coach, Albert Hill, is 4:03.

To skim the mile at such a phenomenal pace the little London sprinter realizes he will have to step out in front of Cunningham and his other three rivals—Chuck Fenske, Blaine Rideout and Archie Sam Roman—at the start and run like a deer all the way. If he decides for some reason only to run to win and reveal his superiority over the Americans, it might not be an exceptionally fast mile, perhaps not better than 4:10. But Wooderson hasn't talked that kind of a race. He nodded agreement yesterday as his coach mapped out the plan by which he thought Sidney could run a 4:03 mile—60 seconds for the first quarter, 61 for the second, 62 for the third, 60 for the fourth.

In the opinion of most track followers, Cunningham is the man Wooderson has to beat. "Old Bones" has been complaining of lack of condition, and that's usually bad news for his opponents.

Ada MacKenzie Wins Golf Title

TORONTO, June 16 (CP)—Ada MacKenzie, veteran stylist from Toronto Ladies' Club, won her sixth Ontario Women's Golf Championship today in a thrilling extra-hole match against Mrs. F. J. Mulqueen the Canadian Champion from Toronto Club.

Mrs. Mulqueen fought a great battle to send the match into extra holes. Three down at the turn, she didn't square the round until the 18th hole. A birdie, four on the 22nd ended the match.

McNeill-Riggs Tennis Final

PARIS, June 16 (AP)—Don McNeill, Oklahoma City, qualified today to match strokes with Bobby Riggs, the United States No. 1 amateur, in the singles final of the French hard courts tennis championships at Roland Garros Stadium Sunday.

McNeill eliminated Edwood Cooke of Portland, Ore., 6-2, 7-5, 7-9, 6-2. Riggs earned his final brackets yesterday in straight sets over Otto Seiget of Hungary.

All-American Final For Ont. Singles Title

TORONTO, June 16 (CP)—The first test to decide Canada's Davis Cup team for 1939 simmered down to the final today with the last Canadian on the sideline and two Detroit buddies, Carl Fischer and Bob Madden, left alone to fight for the Ontario Singles Championship.

This was the way the experts picked the event to end and the Michigan netman gave no indication it could be otherwise as they brushed aside the Canadian in today's quarter-finals and semi-finals. The last native protest was sounded by Bill Pigott of Hamilton.

The big blond, with courage, strength and a good game, forced Madden, No. 2 in Michigan, to four sets before yielding. At the end, however, Madden was in control. He ran off the last three games to make the final score 3-6, 6-4, 9-7, 6-3.

A little earlier Fischer, Michigan's No. 1, had disposed of Don McDiarmid of Ottawa in straight sets, 6-2, 6-4, 6-1. These two results must have given the Davis Cup selection committee what final proof was needed that the Dominion can't count on strong representation for a while yet.

Giants Defeat Cubs 6-4 For 8th Straight Victory; Yankees Down Tribe 4-3

NEW YORK, June 16 (AP)—New York Giants scored their eighth straight victory today and moved into third place in the National Baseball League with a 6-4 triumph in the final of their series with Chicago Cubs.

Frank Joseph Demaree, obtained from Cubs during the winter, and Zeke Bonura, once of Chicago White Sox, starred before their former townsmen. In the first inning Bonura tripled with two on base and Maza scored on Demaree's single. In the fifth Demaree doubled two more runs home. Mel Ott accounted for New York's other run with a double in the third.

Steady hurling by Bob Kilgier and timely hitting by Lee Handley earned a six-game winning streak for Pittsburgh by defeating the Pirates 4-2 victory over Boston.

Handley's triple in the first inning with two mates on base provided the margin of victory. He drove in a third run in the sixth and also stole second twice, running his total for the season to 11. St. Louis Cardinals stamped out a Brooklyn rally in the ninth inning to take the deciding game of their three-game series 7-6 and drop the Dodgers back to fourth place.

The game started as a hurling duel between Lonnie Warneke of the Cardinals and Van Lingle Mungo of the Dodgers but after four scoreless innings St. Louis pushed across two runs in the fifth and finished Mungo with five more in the sixth.

AMERICAN LEAGUE

NEW YORK, June 16 (AP)—Burching their hits to the best of their advantage, New York Yankees squeezed past Cleveland Indians 4-3 today to take the three-game American League baseball series two games to one.

Although he had to be relieved in the eighth, rookie Atley Donald got credit for his seventh victory without a defeat. He gave up seven hits of which two were home runs—by Bruce Campbell in the first inning and Jim Webb in the fifth.

Cleveland's other run came in the eighth on a double by Oscar Grimes and singles by Webb and Rolfe Henzley. After Donald walked Ben Chapman to fill the bases he was replaced by Marlin Russo, who fanned Jeff Heath to get out of trouble.

Ninth Straight Win

Detroit Tigers pounded out their ninth straight victory at the expense of Eider Auker when they compiled a clean sweep of the four-game series with the Red Sox 8-7.

With Charlie Gehring pacing them with a first-inning homer, his eighth of the season, the Tigers clouted Auker for 10 of their 11 hits and all of their runs. Their five-run fourth inning, the result of five singles, a pass and Jim Tabor's error with the bases loaded decided the game.

Jumping on Vic Fraser for four runs in the first inning, Washington Senators beat Chicago White Sox 5-2.

Fraser walked three and gave up singles by Jimmy Bloodworth and George Cast and a triple to Cecil Travis.

End Losing Streak

Philadelphia Athletics ended a six-game losing streak by scoring three runs in the ninth inning to beat St. Louis Browns 11-10.

Harland Clift's homer with one on in the top half of the ninth had given the Browns a two-run lead but George Gill was unable to stop the A's. Wally Moses led off the ninth with a single. Dee Miles also singled and Bob Johnson walked. Vernon Kennedy replaced Gill, but Frankie Hayes blasted his first pitch to centre for a single, tying the score. Sam Chapman then hit to Don Heffner at short and Johnson slid under his throw to catcher Spindel with the winning run.
