HALIFAX MARKETS.—The Chronicle says: The flour market is again inactive and millers are making concessions in prices. Reductions of from 10 to 20 cents per barrel have been made on all grades excepting choice pastry. Sugars are also quoted considerably lower than last week, ruling from 1/4 to 1/2 of a cent per pound less.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Fisheries Protection.

HALIFAX, Nov. 15. A number of Yankee fishing vessels are hovering along the Western shore watching for the schools of mackerel now in Nova Scotia waters. These fish hug the shore, so that almost every mackerel caught by the Americans is at the risk of forfeiture of the vessels, which are not only stealing the fish belonging to Canadian fishermen, but by the use of the destructive purse seines they frighten away the fish they don't capture. The Minister of Fisheries has ordered the Customs launch Argus to patrol the in-shore waters along the Western Shore. She sails at four to-morrow morning under command of Captain Kent, of the Acadia, and she is expected to make things very lively for the visiting pirates.

The first cold snap of the season set in to-night.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 15. The subsidy for the steamship service between Halifax and Jamaica has been awarded to Pickford & Black, of Halifax, and the service between St. John and Demerara to a company promoted by Mr. VanWart, of Fredericton.

Sir Andrew Stuart, Chief Justice of Quebec, has resigned.

An evening paper recently quoted Hon. Mr. Costigan as saying with regard to the anti-Jesuit agitation that "Catholics should fight the agitation to the bitter end. Mr. Costigan positively denies the soft impeachment, and the Ottawa liar is again in the soup.

Cartwright on the Anti-Jesuits.

TORONTO, Nov. 15. Cartwright, in addressing his constituents at Ingersoll last night, spoke freely of the anti-Jesuit agitation and those who were conducting it. He had his own opinion as to their wisdom, but he was forced to say that he thought Mr. McCarthy and his friends were at least courageous and honest in their part. While he was willing to give Mr. McCarthy and his friends credit for being sincere and honest in their position he claimed equal honesty for himself and friends.

More Trouble.

LONDON, Nov. 15. The dockmen demand pay for the time allotted for meals, and the directors refuse the demand, pleading that the claim is specially debarred under the recent agreement. The directors, in a letter to the papers complain of the men's tyranny in refusing to work with non-unionists. The Tisbury dockmen have struck because the foreman and clerks refused to join the union.

A Revolution Reported.

LONDON, Nov. 15. A private cipher cable despatch from Rio Janeiro states that a revolution has broken out there. There is little information of a tangible character. The announcement made in the cipher cable is that the Brazilian ministers have tendered their resignation and the situation is controlled by the army.

An American Legation.

ROME, Nov. 16. Favilla says the Vatican circles are led to expect establishment of an American legation to the Holy See after the return of Mgr. Satolli from Baltimore.

Smuggled Whiskey.

QUEBEC, Nov. 15. A quantity of smuggled American whiskey has been seized by the Customs authorities along the river and gulf placed at 60,000 gallons.

Boom Collapsed.

GLASGOW, Nov. 15. The boom in the pig iron market has collapsed and warrants have declined thirteen shillings.

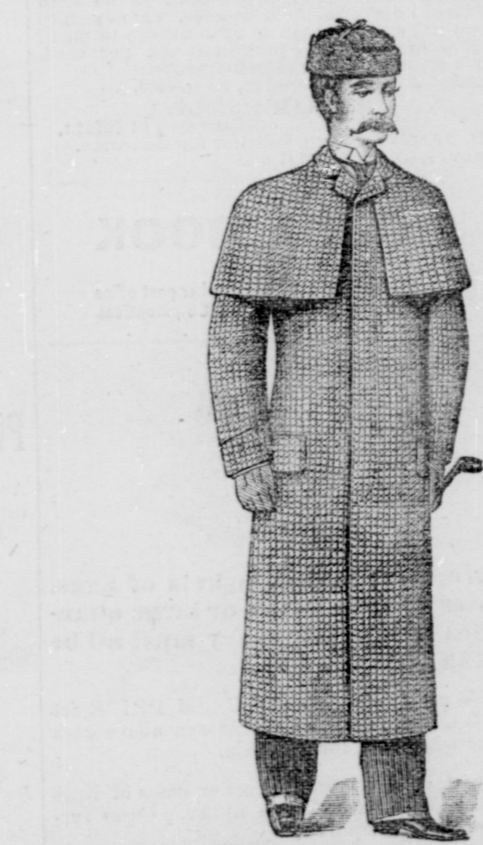
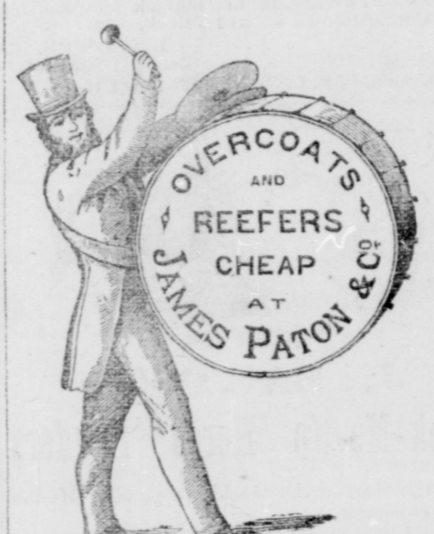
