### Centennial Projects Grants Are Explained

Communities wishing assistance for projects to commemorate Canada's Centennial will have their applications handled by the P.E.I. Centennial Projects Committee. The committee, appointed by the cabinet and chaired by Wendell MacKay, deputy provincial secretary, held its first meeting Wednesday. It decided to prepare regulations or a guide that will inform all municipalities of the types of projects qualifying for assistance. Under a federal-provincial agreement, the federal and provincial governments, and the municipality involved will each pay one-third of the cost of approved projects. The agreement puts a maximum federal spending in the province of \$107,000.

### Conservatives Draft Education Aid Plank

OTTAWA (CP) - With an eye on the next election campaign, the Progressive Conservative Party has drafted an aid-to-education platform plank which includes making municipal taxes paid by home owners a deductible expense for federal income tax. The tax deduction proposal is part of a double-barrelled program to assist in the burden of paying for secondary education. The second feature of it involves an extension of the capital-cost grants for school construction. This is an outgrowth of the program put into effect by the former Conservative government of aid to building technical and vocational schools. Under this program, the federal and provincial governments made agreements whereby the federal government contributed up to 75 per cent of the construction costs of technical schools. PLAN EXTENSION - Informants say the plan is to extend this contributory system to other secondary schools. A third aspect of the Conservative platform on education calls for increasing the per capita grants to universities to \$2 from the present \$1. The Conservative platform will call for a national constitutional conference at which special agreements would be made with provincial governments for assistance to ensure that every Canadian capable of attending university has the opportunity to do so. The aid-to-education plank is based on an estimate that only

### Woods Spraying Said Taking Wildlife Toll

FREDERICTON (CP) - Spraying of DDT on New Brunswick forest lands has had an injurious effect on wildlife, Bruce S. Wright, director of the northeast New Brunswick wildlife station at Fredericton, said here Thursday. Addressing the annual meeting of the New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Public Health Association, Mr. Wright said birds tolerated large amounts of DDT, but their reproductive functions are severely affected by small quantities of the chemical.
