



### AIR FORCE BAND TO GIVE CONCERT

The Central Band of the Royal Canadian Air Force will present a concert at the Confederation Centre Theatre on Thursday evening, Feb. 10, under the combined sponsorship of the Women's Committee of the Confederation Centre Art Gallery and Museum and the Canadian Forces Recruiting Centre. William Young, Public Relations Officer of the band and also a player; and Lt. Cmdr. R.A. Orton, officer commanding Canadian Forces recruiting centre in Charlottetown. Ft.-Lt. Kenneth Moore will direct the 51-piece band. Part of the band had originally been scheduled for a school

program but when the concert was arranged the band was increased to its full size. A feature of the concert will be a special arrangement of Henry Mancini's "Pink Panther" arranged for the band by Sgt. Jerry Hoelke, one of Canada's top jazz arrangers. Sgt. Hoelke has done arrangements for a number of top people in the jazz field, among them Peter Appleby.

### Fish And Game Group Offers Predator Prizes

SOURIS — Following a discussion on the damage done by predators, a motion that a prize be given for the most predators shot was made at a recent meeting of the Souris branch of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association.

The contest begins April 1 and ends the last day of the hunting season. Prizes for the various animals are as follows: Rabbits, \$35; foxes, \$25; skunks, \$15; crows and ravens, 20 cents a pair for the best.

Requirements are that a contestant be a registered member of the local branch of the Fish and Game Association by April 1.

A discussion took place regarding the amount of wild geese one person is permitted to shoot per day. It was unanimously agreed that the limit be reduced to three geese a day per hunter.

**SHOT BIG ONE**  
The prize for the most geese shot last year went to William Jarvis who accounted for 22 birds. He also received the prize for the heaviest bird which weighed 11 and a half pounds. Prize for the second heaviest goose went to John Jarvis who

shot a bird which weighed 10 pounds, 10 ounces.

Thomas Harris and John MacLean were appointed to the nominating committee for the coming year.

A discussion from the minutes of the previous meeting regarding winter works projects and dam sites took place.

One of Canada's newest and up-and-coming folk quartets, The Villagers, enthralled close to 1,000 spectators at the Basilica Recreation Centre last night.

The Villagers appeared as the feature attraction of this year's Prince of Wales Winter Carnival.

From their opening selection, "Raise A Ruckus Tonight", throughout their entire performance The Villagers injected their own enthusiasm through their long sought-after "sound" into the audience and it remained with them throughout the program.

This was best displayed when the young performers from Montreal were asked back for two encore appearances.

With versatility which is displayed only by great performers, each member of the quartet switched from instrument to instrument, be it base to guitar or tambourine to guitar, and from the first note from each of their instruments they revealed that this was more than just another concert; this was love for a certain type of music as love can only be defined.

From the beautiful ballad, "Lonely Tears" a solo sung by the attractive female member of the group, Jane Coutts, to the sing-along, of "The Family of Man" The Villagers program had something to please the most hard-to-please person. And if it was humor, subtle or revealing, which was wanted, the sensational quartet supplied enough to keep the students and other members of society thinking and laughing for months to come.

Their programme included traditional ballads whose author is unknown, the commercial folk tunes now popular with a great part of folk song enthusiasts, and even a number of "yesterday" composed by two of today's greatest composers, John Lennon and Paul McCartney.

One member of the group not mentioned, Fred Turack, their accompanist was every bit as sensational in his own respect.

KINKORA — The village of Kinkora held its annual meeting with George Richards in the chair.

The chairman's report mentioned the erection of the new post office which began in 1955, the new railway signal lights, the new senior citizens' home nearing completion.

A special vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Gladys Mulligan who donated the land for the senior citizens' home.

The financial report showed an operating deficit of \$512 for the year, with revenues of \$3,328 and expenditures totaling \$4,340.

The chairman said it is hoped to have a sports field completed this summer.

Fire Chief Leslie Smith reported that 10 calls to fires were answered by the Kinkora Department last year, that all but one were outside the village. Fire equipment purchased during the year amounted to \$715.

Tentative plans are being made to purchase a pumper or truck. Everett MacLellan was elected to the office of commissioner for the three-year term. The other village commissioners are Arnold McIvor and Vernon MacCardie.
