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Capacity House Sees Opening Of "Apron Strings"

—"Apron Strings", a rib-tickling, three-act comedy from the pen of Norman Macdonald, C.D.A., went on the boards for its premiere last night before a capacity house in the High School auditorium and with well merited success and round after round of applause as the opening nights showed their approval of the play.
Like its predecessor "Keeping Up With The Van Hornes", also written by Mr. Macdonald, the sense of last night's play is laid in Prince Edward Island and the role of "Honey Halliday" portrayed by Tony Spenceley, is that of a shy, retiring young man, the son of a first World War ace, whose mother, fearing that her son may follow in the footsteps of his dad has always pampered the boy. In consequence he has grown up somewhat stified but as the play moves smoothly along "Honey" finds nature in capacity house and as his manhood asserts itself, he enlists in the air force and like his father before him becomes a war hero.

With professional skill the author has woven into his plot a clever mixture of comedy and thrills with even a couple of lady spies thrown in who are eventually thwarted by an unusual twist in the plot which brings everything to a successful climax, ties up the right guys and gals to each other and provides an evening's drama that is superior to many of the so-called professional royalty plays. And the tempo, where most amateurs fall down, was maintained throughout.

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16-Unit Motel Planned For Summerside

—A motel consisting of 16 units will be constructed at Summerside before the latter part of July by Mr. Vaughan Groom, proprietor of the Garden of the Gulf Court.
In making the announcement yesterday, Mr. Groom, who has been in the tourist business at Summerside for the past 16 years, stated that the new motel will be of fire proof construction and will be located on a lot adjoining Robson's Restaurant, less than one mile east of Summerside.
Construction will begin early in the spring, and the new motel will supplement the present cottage accommodation of the Garden of the Gulf Court which consists of 36 units.
Provision will be made for extension of the motel if the need is indicated. Although all of the new units will be incorporated into one building, each will have a separate entrance.—S.

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Fish And Game Ass'n Meeting Held At Tignish

—The regular meeting of the Prince County Fish and Game Association was held last night at Tignish with the president, Mr. Omar Bernard of Tignish presiding. Minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Norman McLeod.
A general discussion was then held regarding the reasons for the unusual scarcity of ducks this year and it was thought by many present that fine weather during the opening weeks of the season resulted in the ducks and geese remaining offshore. Drying up of streams caused by deterioration of dams etc., was another reason advanced as well as losses caused by skunks and foxes. Cold wet weather during the nesting season was considered another factor resulting in a generally low duck population.
Regarding the hunting seasons it was approved by the meeting that October 1st be recommended as the opening date for ducks, geese and Hungarian partridge provided that a sixty-day season be obtained for migratory birds for Prince Edward Island as is the case in other Provinces.
