On Nov. 24 Mayor Stewart again wrote Mr. Chevrier, asking to be furnished with complete details as to the cost of maintenance and revenue which might accrue, also a list of the airports which were municipally operated.

In addition, certain Departmental maintenance equipment would also be made available to the City at a nominal rental. "So far as I can see," the letter added, "there is no reason why the City should not be eligible for a maintenance subsidy on the same basis as that granted to certain other municipally-owned airports."
