They were traded to Miners for defenceman Eddie Bolan and forward Roger Jodoin, both members of the Glace Bay club last season. Bolan, Jodoin and Trent Anderson, who started the season with Moncton Hawks, were suspended by the M. A. H. A. for playing without a release from Miners. The Glace Bay club pressed its claim for the players and Anderson returned to the club during the week-end. Jodoin, who was with Moncton two years ago, and Bolan balked at returning to the Cape Breton loop and a swap was arranged. Dalgleish was a high-scoring defenceman in the west coast circuit. He is 28 and a native of Montreal.
